

Hop Crops in England.

The following reports on the growth of hops in the English plantations for the week ending Wednesday, July 5, 1899, are furnished by "The Observer" of Canterbury, Kent, and presented with the compliments of M. H. Durst of 47 Etna Road, Brixton, S. W., London, resident agent in England for the Durst Beer River Hops, of Yuba County, California. These reports are furnished gratuitously, and in the hope that they will be of service in keeping the growers advised of the crop prospects abroad.

(Ashford District.) In most of the gardens of this district there has been good progress in growth during the past week, and the bine may be said generally to have pretty well overtaken all arrears. There are of course some few exceptions to this state of affairs, some gardens being rather slack of bine owing to the attacks of the wireworm, and the result of the recent dry weather. The rains that have been received since last Thursday have done much good, but nowhere has the quantity been sufficient; a thorough soaking is necessary to get the roots well supplied. On stiff and poor soils the foliage looks rather unhealthy, the leaves being yellow and weakly looking; but on the better soils there is no indication of an unfavorable character. The midsummer shoots are making good headway and in the best gardens the cultivation of the soil must be done quickly, or it will be impossible to get it done at all. There is no attack of vermin worth mentioning, although a few fly and lice may be seen here and there.

(Benenden Weald.) Bine growing very fast and throwing out laterals in abundance. Very little vermin. More sunshine is now required.

(Bethersden.) More rain is badly wanted in this district, as many gardens are turning yellow from the lack of sufficient moisture and the early privations which the plant had to undergo.

(Downton and Neighborhood.) The bine continues to make good progress. There is not much vermin, in fact washing has not commenced at present.

(Bridge and Neighborhood.) The bine has made a lot of growth lately, most of it being now well over the tops of poles at places.

(Canterbury Parishes.) The rains have been very beneficial, and the bine has grown very fast. The lateral shoots are developing in grand style, and appear very strong. There is no increase of vermin. The rains are rather conducive to mould at places.

(Chilham.) The rain on Friday was very beneficial to the hop plant. There are a few fly and lice at places. Some growers have commenced washing and others are talking about beginning. The bine generally looks well except the young plantations, which look as if they have been suffering from the want of moisture.

(Graveney and Throley.) There is a sprinkling of fly and some lice talking about beginning. The bine in the three parishes has been washing. It is questionable, however, whether there was any necessity for the operation with so small an amount of vermin.

(Hamstead.) There is a good deal of fly in this locality and the bine is slack and weakly. In some gardens it has not got beyond half way up the poles. Growers in the district are losing heart and declining to do any expense in the matter of cultivation.

(Harbledown.) The lateral growth still makes progress, but at the expense of the heads. Lice are breeding rapidly which will make washing imperative in all well cultivated grounds during the next week. Cultivation improved, the genial showers greatly assisting the midges in getting a finer thir.

(Lekham and Wickham.) The hops still grow, and are mostly over the top of the wire or poles, as they should be by now. The weak places are filling up nicely. Fly and lice are slightly on the increase, and no doubt washing will have to be resorted to later on.

(Lower Hardres.) Hops continue in a healthy condition, and make rapid progress. The color of the foliage is about as we like to see it. There is still the drawback of unevenness of bine and the ravages of wireworm. A few more fly and lice than were visible last week.

(Petham and Southwold.) The plant is still making good progress and looking a good color. I have seen more fly this week, and there are a few lice to be found.

(Maidstone and District.) The progress of the bine during the past week has been in every respect most satisfactory, and prospects generally have improved greatly. Vermen has increased at places, and washing has been done at Barning and Bearsted. Slight traces of mould here and there, but nothing to cause the least anxiety.

(Paddock Wood.) The bine is growing rapidly and looks well. There is, however, a good deal of vermin, and several growers have resorted to washing. Some mould has been seen at places.

(Rocheester and District.) The heavy rain Wednesday night did immense good, reinvigorating the bine and cleansing it of the vermin that had settled on it. The grounds have rarely looked better than they do at the present time.

(Rainham and Newington.) In all the well farmed grounds in these parishes the bine is luxuriant and full of vigor, and cultivation is well forward. There are some neglected gardens in which the bine is backward and uneven. Vermen does not appear to increase.

(St. Stephen's-Canterbury.) Steady growth has been the characteristic of the past week. The bine keeps a good healthy color and looks promising.

(Sturry.) The hops continue to make good progress, the bine looking healthy although somewhat uneven in most gardens. There is certainly an increase in vermin since I last wrote, but even now not enough to cause planters to wash. During the past two or three days has blown the heads away from the strings and caused a good deal of extra labor in training.

(Sittingbourne.) Since last week we have had a beautiful rainfall, and this has improved the appearance of the plant immensely. The stringed grounds present a very fine prospect. There has been a little washing, but the attack of vermin is extremely light and not likely to do harm if it does not extend.

(Tonbridge and District.) Thanks to the rains and fairly genial weather the growth of the bine during the week has been astonishingly rapid. Fly is to be found, but there is very little deposit, and washing is not necessary. The general prospect is exceedingly good.

(Teynham.) The hops in this neighborhood have improved since the rain, and the bine is now topping the strings. Brambling bine is still very uneven, but will make up if we get some warm weather after the rains. Very little washing has been done yet, as vermin does not increase.

(Thanet.) The hops are now of good color and growing fast, and the rain of last Thursday had a beneficial effect upon them. There are, however, many pieces very uneven in bine, one or two particularly so, and can produce, under favorable circumstances, but a small crop. This unevenness is attributed to wireworm. Altogether the bine cannot be considered up to the average at this time of year. There are the slightest appearances of vermin, but nothing at present to cause uneasiness or anxiety. The cultivation is now fairly good.

(Wye and Boughton Aluph.) The hop bine has grown fast, but there are still a few fly to be found.

(Woodnesborough.) Since the heavy thunderstorm of last Thursday, the hops in this parish have made good progress, and we have no fly or lice worth mentioning.

(Surrey.) Farham.—The bine continues to do well and has not looked better for years past. It is practically clean and free from mould. A hallstrom broke over the district of Badshot Lea on Wednesday and cut off some of the heads of the bine.

(Worcester.) Hops continue to grow very fast and make rapid progress. There is fly to be found in many places. The bine continues warm days and nights, however, we cannot get getting a fair crop of hops.

(Worcester.) Business keeps very quiet on the local market, and there is no alteration in values of the few articles in merchants' hands, while growers' stocks are practically exhausted. The well cultivated plantations in this district made excellent growth during the early part of the week; but the last two or three days of the week, in many places, the bine has fallen over the tops of the poles and throwing out side shoots. Vermen has not appreciably increased so that very little washing has been necessary, but some places still show the effect of the wireworm. The weather during the week, however, was not so favorable as it was on the 12th and 13th of July.—J. H. Meredith & Co., Worcester, July 3d.
