LET US HAVE IMPARTIAL INVESTIGATION.

In the city water supply investigation now going on, it should be borne in mind constantly that there is no opposition to investigation fully and exhaustively of any of the plans of supply proposed, with a single exception.

At the meeting of the committee Wednesday night, one of the members sitting in judgment, and presumably there to hear testimony, ascertain facts and then formulate a judgment, declared that it is "nonsense" to talk of underground channels on the east side; that the geological formation would disprove any such claim; that there are no artesian wells in the valley; that it would take a 7,000,000-gallon pump to test east side wells; and finally that the water taken out would have to be resupplied and the entire district would be drained to furnish such supply.

The "Record-Union" asserts that there is an underground, unfailing supply of pure, clear water on the east side. That it comes from a subterranean stream or streams, probably several of them. Unlike the committee, the "Record-Union" has solid reasons to advance, superior to those of the dogmatists employ.

Out of these wells living, well formed, full-eyed trout of the mountain stream type, have been taken. These wells have not failed. Even in the driest years they have continued to yield and bless the husbandman and insure his orchard, vineyard and garden.

The water thus yielded is not river water by sparge, a fact established by analysis, common knowledge and the absurdity of a river of the order of the Sacramento or the American pressing or sending down sufficient water by percolation for the use of so large a community as that residing between this city and Galt.

Not enough water falls from the heavens in any given year over the east side area to equal the supply drawn from the wells in that district. The source, therefore, is undoubtedly in higher altitudes, where rainfall, snow and living springs never fail to supply the thirsty earth.

The geological formation of the whole east side section does prove, the chemist committee to the contrary notwithstanding, that there may be and are subterranean streams flowing beneath the valley in this vicinity; and that there may be and are constantly supplied bodies of pure, clear, potable water deep beneath the surface, from which domestic supplies may be and now are drawn.

It is said by those best qualified to know the facts that the marriage of persons at Reno, in Nevada, who have been divorced in California, and are prohibited from remarrying for a year, is worth \$10,000 annually to the Nevada county. It is an ill wind that blows no one good.

Investigation of the east side source without the exhaustive examination it should have, and accept the ideas and theories of those who can discover neither organic nor inorganic matter in the river water; and those who talk gibberish of geological formation rendering subterranean water courses or deposits impossible, and the belief that they may exist and do exist as "nonsense," then this whole water search business might just as well stop here and now.

As one of the committee members well said, if the jury is packed in advance and a test refused of the east side source, the people will never submit to it, for the people believe in fair play, and an even and impartial investigation, no more and no less for one than for another.

Unhappily for Sacramento no one now has a money interest in advocating the east side supply source. There is no company, corporation or syndicate behind it. Once upon a time a powerful company did propose to develop that source and was willing to invest large capital upon the proposition.

Now, there is no one backing the east side system who has money in it; it rests upon its merits and upon the faith of those who have used the water from it for two score of years and more. There is no company with water to sell from that source, no interest of any kind for gain pushing its claims before the committee.
