At noon bids were opened on the question of betting privileges. There were a number of competitors, but B. W. Cavanaugh was the victor.

The Board formally indorsed the late action of the Executive Committee relative to season tickets, music, etc.

J. W. Wilson was awarded the contract for hay, which will be bought in such quantities as are needed, rather than in bulk at the beginning.

Director Grove L. Johnson tried to have the Board return to the old \$5 season ticket plan, making the ticket cover the Park and Pavilion.


