CITIZENS' FAIR COMMITTEE IS AT WORK.

General Progress is Reported and Many Ladies Will Aid the Social Features.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Citizens' State Fair Club, at the Golden Eagle last night, it was determined to have the sub-committees of the Financial Committee make a vigorous canvass for funds between now and Saturday.

The matter of closing a contract with A. Menke for exhibiting ten or more ostriches was left with H. I. Seymour. Mr. Menke values his large birds at \$200 each, and he wants the committee to stand responsible for their loss or injury.

W. F. Purnell, of the Reception Committee reported that twenty-eight organizations of ladies would probably take part in the reception on Ladies' Night, which is September 4th.

Dear Madam: The opening night of the State Fair (September 4th) has been set apart as Ladies' Night, and it is the earnest desire of the Citizens' State Fair Club that the ladies of Sacramento make a special effort to attend that night.

Make it a general "At Home" night and receive all your friends at the Pavilion. A special program has been prepared and the night promises to be one long to be remembered in the history of the State Fair.

We specially request that you use your personal efforts to make it a success and make special effort to see that all the members of your "club" attend.

The committee desires to send invitations to all the ladies of the city and would respectfully request that you send or deliver to 610 J street, at your earliest convenience, a list of all the members of your society.

In this connection the offer of the Tuesday Literary Club was received, wherein a committee from that organization agreed to provide society features.

Herman Fisher was given authority to hire Japanese from the Mission to furnish a sword dance, singing, and other racial amusement features.

The question of advertising the Fair in San Francisco was, after much desultory discussion, left to Frank L. Gray, of the Committee of Publicity.

It is the intention of the committee to try to induce merchants and others to decorate their houses with flags and bunting during Fair week.

The following report of President Enright of the Citizens' State Fair Club was read and adopted:

"Sacramento, August 23, 1899. On the committee on Reception reported on the 16th that at a meeting of ladies representatives of the various clubs and clubs, a resolution was adopted declaring it to be the sense of the meeting, that the various ladies' organizations take part and provide society features for every night not already assigned.

"I recommend that the offer be accepted and that the thanks of this Executive Committee be tendered to various ladies' clubs.

"I recommend that the ladies of the Tuesday Literary Club be invited to take charge of the reception features for Tuesday night, September 5th, and that Ladies of Relief Corps, G. A. R., be invited to take charge on Wednesday night, September 6th. The ladies of the Saturday Musical Club and of the Choral Society be invited to take charge on Monday night, September 11th. The Ladies of the Caledonians be invited to take charge Wednesday night, September 13th. The ladies of the Club of 190 be invited to take charge on Thursday night, September 14th, and that the Kingsley Art Club Friday, September 15th.

"I recommend that your committee on Receptions, W. F. Purnell, Chairman, be authorized to arrange with privilege at the Pavilion for light refreshments for the use of each of the clubs; also for the Daughters of Rebeccah for Thursday, September 7th, for the ladies of Commercial Club Friday, September 8th; Native Daughters, Saturday, September 9th, and for the Ladies of the Grange Tuesday, September 12th. MISSING HUBERT HOWARD. Mrs. Howard Corrects Some Mistakes Made Yesterday.

Mrs. Howard, wife of Hubert Howard, the missing fireman of the steamer San Joaquin No. 2, who it is feared was accidentally drowned near Knight's Landing on Sunday, says there were inaccuracies in the published accounts of her husband's disappearance.

She says that Howard did not come out to California "in a spirit of pique" because of disagreement with his father. That such a statement is wholly without foundation. Father and son parted on the very best of terms when the young man set out for this State. Mr. Howard is not cousin to Mrs. Richard May, Jr., of this city, but to Mrs. J. R. May.

The brother of Howard, she says, did not come to California in pique either, and such a statement would cause anguish to his father, the relations between father and son being cordial. The brother was not employed in the Pinole Powder Works, where he was killed by an explosion, but he was visiting there only.

Mrs. Howard is firmly of the opinion that her husband was drowned, and that the drowning was accidental, no reason existing for any other conclusion.

The statement made in connection with Mr. Howard's disappearance were based on information given by a relative of his by marriage.

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CENTRAL COMMITTEE MEETS

PETITION FOR A REPUBLICAN PRIMARY.

The Delegates Will be Apportioned to and Elected by Wards.

The Republican City Central Committee held a meeting last night at the rooms of the Chairman, William M. Sims, who presided.

Messrs. Sims, Daroux, Rohrer, Cavannah, Conran, Finn, Meister, Eagan and Smith were present.

The report of the special committee appointed at the last meeting was presented and is as follows:

Petition of the Republican party to participate in the city primary election to be held in the city of Sacramento, State of California, September 26, 1899.

To the Board of Trustees of the City of Sacramento, State of California: The petition and certificate of the Republican party respectfully shows:

That the Republican party is a political party duly organized and existing, which at the last general election, prior to the ensuing primary election, polled at least 3 per cent. of the entire vote cast in the city of Sacramento, State of California.

That the governing committee of said Republican party in and for said city of Sacramento is a city committee of which William M. Sims is the duly elected, qualified and acting Chairman, and Wilber F. Smith the duly elected, qualified and acting Secretary.

That it is the intention of said party to hold a City Convention for the purpose of making nominations of candidates for public offices, to be voted for at the next ensuing general municipal election that is to be held on Tuesday, November 7, 1899.

That the said Republican party requests that a place be given it upon the official primary election ballot.

That said convention shall be composed of 256 delegates, apportioned in said city of Sacramento on a basis numerically of the average vote cast for the candidates of the Republican party at the last preceding general election, as hereinafter more particularly set forth.

That said delegates are to serve in said City Convention and in any or all subdivisions of the same for any purpose whatsoever.

That the delegates to said convention shall be apportioned by wards, upon a basis of one delegate for each fifteen votes cast at the said last general election for the candidates of said party in each of the wards in said city of Sacramento, and one additional delegate for a remainder of ten such votes or over.

That said apportionment is specified in detail as follows, to wit: To First Ward are apportioned eight delegates.

To Second Ward there are apportioned seventeen delegates.

To Third Ward there are apportioned twenty-four delegates.

To Fourth Ward there are apportioned thirty-one delegates.

To Fifth Ward there are apportioned forty delegates.

To Sixth Ward there are apportioned thirty-one delegates.

To Seventh Ward there are apportioned thirty-seven delegates.

To Eighth Ward there are apportioned thirty-five delegates.

To Ninth Ward there are apportioned twenty-three delegates.

That this writing or petition is authenticated by the proper officers of the party committee.

Wherefore, the said Republican party requests your honorable board to give it a place upon the official primary election ballot, to be used at the primary election to be held in said city of Sacramento on the 26th day of September, 1899.
