

OUR RETURNED HEROES.

Young Warriors Who Are Deserving of Some Recognition. The suggestion that a reception, banquet, etc., be given to the Sacramento volunteers returned from service in the Philippine Islands, is meeting with general favor, and it only remains for some organization to take the matter in hand.

There are now quite a number of the returned soldiers here, but as several more are expected to arrive soon, the reception should be postponed until all are here. Among the latest to return is James E. Hicks, who reached here on Friday last. Mr. Hicks is a grandson of P. S. McQuaid, a well-known citizen, and has already settled down to business, being interested with his sister in conducting the Philadelphia House.

When volunteers were called for Mr. Hicks was a student at the Stanford University, and with several other students he enlisted in the First California Regiment, which participated in the principal battles near Manila last year. He did not return with the regiment, having remained over in Japan, but came on the Zealandia last week.

As nearly as can be ascertained those now in the city or expected to be here shortly and who fought for the flag in the trenches about Manila are: Frank and Richard Coyne, A. A. Dasonville, James E. Hicks, Hayward Reed, O. Anderson, John Ewer, George Fry, Walter Leitch, — Striker, John Byrne, — Russell and Hugh Strachan, J. H. Watkins of the Signal Corps, has been reported as having decided to remain in Manila.

Some of these young warriors served in the infantry, others in the cavalry, others in the artillery and others still did valiant service in the Signal Corps. All have been under the fire of Filipino guns and some bear the scars of bullets. Other communities have extended public welcomes to their young men returned from the front, and it would seem that Sacramento should do likewise.

JUST LIKE DEWEY.

He Stole a March on His Own People Yesterday Morning.

Admiral Dewey captured New York yesterday morning before the people were awake, and the fact of his unexpected arrival was forced on Sacramento a little before 5 o'clock by the furious blowing of the fire-alarm whistle, supplementing the alarm in various parts of the city. The fire-whistle was blown by order of the mayor.

People generally did not understand what all the noise was about. It was thought the city whistle was sounded for a fire and that the valve had gotten out of order, as on some former occasions, as Admiral Dewey was expected to arrive for a couple of days yet.

At 10 o'clock Adjutant General Seaman, in accordance with plans previously arranged by Governor Gage, caused an Admiral's salute of seventeen guns to be fired in Capitol Park.

These demonstrations, with a general raising of flags, during the day, constituted Sacramento's welcome back to America of the hero of Manila Bay.

CHESS CLUB.

Opening Games of the Tournament Began Last Evening.

The tournament of the Sacramento Chess Club opened last night under very promising circumstances. A number of new members were elected, and owing to the increased number of entries for the tournament it was decided to play but one series of games, instead of two. THE VAN NORMAN CASE.

Demurrers Interposed and Taken Under Adversement.

The three indictments against W. G. Van Norman for receiving stolen goods came up before Judge Hart yesterday and Van Norman's counsel, Hiram W. Johnson, interposed a demurrer in two of them.

In the third he interposed a demurrer and also made a motion to dismiss because the complaint had been signed by the District Attorney's clerk instead of by the District Attorney himself. Judge Hart took the cases under advisement until this morning.

The habeas corpus cases of May Morlan and Byrl Morlan, minors, came up before Judge Hart yesterday and were taken under advisement until this morning.

The father seeks to take the custody of the children from the mother on the ground that she is not a fit person to care for them. Among other testimony taken was that of two old ladies, who stated that she was in the habit of riding on a bicycle, dressed in bloomers.

FOUR MONTHS IN JAIL.

James Scott Allowed to Plead Guilty of Petty Larceny.

James Scott appeared before Judge Hart yesterday to plead on an information for burglary.

Assistant District Attorney Wachhorst asked for the charge reduced to one of petty larceny, Scott having hitherto borne a good character and having committed the crime he was charged with in daylight in the presence of several people.

Scott pleaded guilty to the minor offense and was sentenced to the County Jail for four months.

The Remains of the Late S. E. Carrington Brought Home.

The remains of the late Samuel E. Carrington were brought home from Pacific Grove yesterday afternoon and taken to the family residence on F street, between Tenth and Eleventh. Many sympathizing friends called on Mrs. Carrington and daughters last evening.

Arrangements are now being made for the funeral, which will take place to-morrow forenoon.

State Printer Johnston yesterday delivered to the Superintendent of Public Instruction the first installment (3,000) of school registers, the first printed since 1885. The remainder of the registers (7,000) will be furnished as soon as they can be turned out.

FOREST FIRES.

Have Done Immense Damage in the Cuyamaca Mountains. SAN DIEGO, Sept. 26.—Forest fires have been raging in the Cuyamaca Mountains, fifty miles west of here, for over a week and have done immense damage to timber and watersheds.

The flames started about ten days ago on the north peak of the Cuyamaca Range, known as Kelly's Mountain, and adjoining the Cuyamaca reservoir. How it was started no one seems to know. It spread in a northerly direction, burning over thousands of acres of timber lands, destroying the sawmill on the Kelly ranch, and has rendered the road impassable between Stonewall and Julian. The house of James Talbot, which was only saved by heroic efforts, as the fire burned around it.

The fire has been checked toward the north, but is now burning toward the southern and main peak of the Cuyamaca Range, which is heavily timbered.

It is reported this afternoon that the Golden King gold mine, in the path of the fire, was destroyed, so far as buildings and machinery are concerned.

WEATHER CONDITIONS.

Cloudy Along the Coast, Except at San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 26.—Maximum temperature: Eureka 54, Fresno 98, Los Angeles 82, Red Bluff 98, San Luis Obispo 90, San Diego 68, Sacramento 92, Independence 90, Yuma 108.

The pressure has risen slowly over the northern half of the Pacific Coast. An area of high pressure is passing rapidly over Oregon and Washington.

The temperature has remained nearly stationary over the country west of the Rocky Mountains. In the great valleys of California it continues 12 degrees or more above the normal, giving favorable weather for raising making fruit crops.

The weather is cloudy along the coast of California, except in the vicinity of San Francisco.

MISS LORENA KRAPP.

The Young Lady Dies at the Agnews Asylum.

SAN JOSE, Sept. 23.—Miss Lorena Krapp, the young lady who was committed to Agnews about ten days since under such distressing circumstances, is dead.
