

CITY BOARD OF EDUCATION.

SALARIES AND USUAL MONTHLY CLAIMS ALLOWED.

There Will Be Two Weeks' Vacation at the Holiday Time.

At the meeting of the City Board of Education last night Directors Sherburn, Atkinson, Perkins, Johnson, Elliott, Ranson and Stack were present; Director Elliott presiding.

Salaries and the usual monthly claims were allowed.

Miss Pritchard addressed the board in relation to the proposition to have a supervisor for kindergarten schools. She recalled the fact that she had formerly

conducted a kindergarten training school. She offered for a salary of \$40 per month, to accept the position of kindergarten supervisor and give lessons in kindergarten training to assistants, who would in two years, under her instruction, become competent kindergarten teachers.

Director Atkinson, for the Furniture and Repairs Committee, recommended the placing of a transom over the door of the new room at Twenty-fourth and K streets, the air of the room being bad during school sessions.

A bicycle rack was ordered made for use of the high school boys.

Superintendent Erlewine stated that the substratum of bricks in the Sixteenth and N street yard were showing above the ground and several children had been hurt on them.

Director Atkinson advocated having the school yards graded and sown with Bermuda grass and the fences taken away.

Director Sherburn said that, in the opinion of many people, the trees in the school yard are too thick on the south side and that half of them should be taken out.

Director Ranson did not think they should be removed.

Director Atkinson said he was glad to find Director Sherburn voicing his views in regard to tree trimming.

Director Sherburn moved that the committee be authorized to remove the trees according to their discretion, but it was decided that the committee would investigate the matter and report to the board.

Director Elliott, for the Kindergarten Committee, reported that he had given attention to Miss Pritchard's proposition, but financially it was in the way and unless that was in some way obviated, he did not see how it could be accepted.

The matter was continued till some future time.

Miss Pritchard proposed that if she secured enough pupils for training school, she would give the services of her pupils gratuitously to the schools a part of the time, on condition that she be allowed the use of the kindergarten room at Thirteenth and G three afternoons in the week.

Director Sherburn said he thought it would be best to see whether or not the teachers favored the pupils being sent to assist them.

Miss Pritchard said she only wished them to assist if the teachers desire it.

The proposition was then accepted and the board adjourned.
