

TRANSPORTS AND GUNBOATS.

A Fleet Leaves Manila on an Important Expedition.

Its Destination Supposed to be Dagupan.

General Wheaton Commands, and the Purpose is Thought to be to Move Down the Dagupan-Manila Railroad Towards Tarlac—Should Concerted Operations Succeed, Organized Insurrection on a Large Scale Should Soon Cease.

MANILA, Nov. 5, 9 p. m.—This evening a fleet of transports and gunboats left Manila for the most important expedition of the autumn campaign. Its destination is supposed to be Dagupan or some other northern port.

General Wheaton commands, with a brigade consisting of the Thirteenth Infantry, the Thirty-third Infantry, two guns of the Sixth Artillery and two Gatling guns. The transports Sheridan, Francisco de Reyes and Aztec carry the troops, with the gunboat Helena as escort.

A dispatch boat was sent ahead to arrange a rendezvous with the United States cruiser Charleston and the other warships that are patrolling the north coast of Luzon.

It is assumed here that the purpose of the expedition is to move down the Dagupan-Manila Railroad towards Tarlac, or to prevent Aguinaldo's forces making another base farther north.

Dagupan and Appari are the strongholds of the insurgents in the north. It has been the unanimous opinion of military experts that Dagupan should be made a base of operations, but sufficient troops have heretofore been lacking.

With Generals Wheaton, MacArthur and Lawton moving upon Tarlac from three directions and the mountains hemming in the other side, the insurgents' capital will soon become untenable.

Aguinaldo may attempt to shift his headquarters to the rich tobacco country at the northern end of the island. It will be difficult for the insurgents to escape.

Should the concerted operations succeed, organized insurrection on a large scale should be at an end early next spring, although guerrilla warfare is likely to continue for a long time. No one anticipates that the insurgents will make many hard battles.

MAGALING TAKEN.

Two Columns of MacArthur's Division Slay the Natives.

MANILA, Nov. 6, 10:15 a. m.—Two columns of General MacArthur's division yesterday took Magaling, about six miles northwest of Angeles. Colonel Smith, with two battalions of the Seventeenth Infantry, two guns of the First Artillery and a body of engineers, advanced from Angeles. Major O'Brien, with a battalion of the Seventeenth Infantry and two troops of the Fourth Cavalry move from Calicut.

Colonel Smith killed eleven insurgents, wounded 128 and captured fifty as well as taking a lot of insurgent transportation.

Major O'Brien killed forty-nine insurgents, wounded many and took twenty-eight prisoners. The Americans had eleven men wounded.

SHARKEY IS SORE.

He Wants to Meet Jeffries Again and the Latter is Willing.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Thomas Sharkey, in pain and encased in a plaster support, spent today quietly in his quarters. He was constantly attended by his physicians who ordered him to be absolutely quiet. The defeated pugilist was restive and uncomfortable till a sleeping powder had been administered. Then he fell into a deep sleep, which lasted all afternoon.

The burden of Sharkey's talk was that he wanted to meet Jeffries again. The champion, on the other hand, while declaring that he was in the hands of his managers, asserted his willingness to grant the sailor his desire, though he did not see why he should be expected to do so.

"But, you know," he said, "there is such a thing as being driven to a fight."

Sharkey said that he wanted another fight in eight weeks and was going to post \$5,000 forfeit to-morrow. O'Rourke, his manager, said he was doing his best to bring the match about.

"To-morrow morning early," O'Rourke said, "I am going to post with George Conditine a \$5,000 forfeit for Sharkey to get a return match with Jeffries. It will be a bet as well as a forfeit. Sharkey says he feels all right and can fight at the end of eight weeks. I think, however, that the period is too short, and I will name four months as the time. I do not know whether Jeffries and his manager will cover this or not, but we will leave it to the general public to decide just how our position is. Jeffries owes it to Sharkey and the public to give us another match. We are in earnest about this. Sharkey feels he is the better man and he ought to have a fair chance to prove it."

Brady said, when asked about a return match: "What I have determined is this. Jeffries needs a rest. He would have knocked Sharkey clean out early in the

fight if he had been recovered from his fight with Fitzsimmons. He has kicked Sharkey twice. I think it will be next August, before Jeffries has another fight, and my impressions are that it will take place in Paris."

MURDER AND SUICIDE.

A Husband Shoots His Wife and Then Kills Himself.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 5.—George Barthel, a foreman in the wholesale house of the Simmons Hardware Company, today fatally shot his wife, beat his wife's father and mother into insensibility and then killed himself. Barthel had been separated from his wife for four years, and during that time had made repeated requests that she return to him, but to no avail.

This afternoon he walked into the home of his wife's parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Rohlfing, with a revolver in each hand, and without saying a word he fired a shot at his wife. The ball went wide, and Mrs. Barthel fled from the room. He then knocked Rohlfing senseless, but he did not kill him. Mrs. Rohlfing endeavored to protect her husband and in the struggle received a broken nose from blows from the weapon that also rendered her unconscious. Barthel then chased his wife from the house, and, catching her at the gate, fired three shots, two taking effect in the head, causing mortal wounds, and one in the arm. Barthel stood over his wife's fallen form for an instant as if to satisfy himself that she was dead and then blew out his brains. At a late hour to-night Mr. Barthel was found by his revolver, consciousness, and Mrs. Barthel was reported dying.

Old Resident of San Jose Dead.

SAN JOSE, Nov. 5.—Marfano Hernandez, an old resident of this city, died this evening of apoplexy. He was 57 years old. About twenty years ago he shot and killed Juan Anzar, a gambler, in self defense and was promptly acquitted.

Found Dead in Bed.

SAN JOSE, Nov. 5.—John H. Fitzpatrick, a native of Portland, Me., aged 44 years, was found dead in his bed at Santa Clara this afternoon. He was a laborer and had been sick for some time.

Signal Corps Can Now Operate at as Great a Distance.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—General Greeley, Chief Signal Officer, says there will be no practical demonstration of the Marconi system of wireless telegraphy in connection with the signal corps of the army.

It is said that the instruments brought by Marconi to this country are unsuited to greater distances than twelve miles by water. The signal corps, which operates a system of its own at a distance of twelve miles, was unwilling to have demonstrations made unless there could be assurance of greater distances than those promised. This concluded the negotiations, which have been in progress for some time. It is understood Marconi will sail to-morrow for England in connection with the use of the wireless system in South Africa.

No Improvement.

PATERSON (N. J.), Nov. 5.—There was no improvement in the condition of Vice President Hobart to-day. Messages of sympathy were received from President McKinley, Secretary and Mrs. Hay and General Wesley Merritt. Among the callers at the Hobart residence was Attorney General Griggs.
