THE WAR IN SOUTH AFRICA.

sorties and risking another Nicholson's Net disaster. Generally, however, the cheery tone of the dispatch, showing that there is no anxiety at Ladysmith as regards the ability of the beleaguered garrison to hold its own, has had an excellent effect on the country.

From the fact that the general White is able to take the offensive and shell a Boer camp, it seems that Ladysmith is not so closely besieged as was supposed. Not much importance, however, is attached to the shelling of the Boer laager, as the War Office has no communication of the story that the Orange Free State's camp at Besters has been captured.

It is becoming apparent that all the British and Boer forces are based on the loyalty of the population are hopelessly at sea, or there has been a very serious leakage of Dutch sympathizers from Natal and Cape Colony. Otherwise there is no accounting for the large forces of Burgers reported from all directions.

The evacuation of Colenso and the reported withdrawal of the British force from Stormberg, are still unexplained. The former may be due to either the Boer artillery rendering the place untenable, or to the fact that pressure elsewhere, possibly at Pietermaritzburg, has necessitated the concentration of a threatened point of all available troops.

It is said that if the objective of the Boers traversing Zululand was Pietermaritzburg, they ought shortly to be heard from. That the position is regarded as serious is apparent from the haste with which the Boers are hurrying to the Cape Station.

With regard to Stormberg, it is claimed that if it turns out to be true that the place has been evacuated it may either be due to the impossibility at present of providing an adequate garrison to defend the important supplies against the Boer raids or to a change in General Buller's plans where by General Methuen's division will be landed at Durban to relieve General White.

If the latter plan is decided on, the nearest available stores are those at Stormberg, and the quickest method of making the necessary provision for an advance will be to railroad these stores to East London, whence they would reach Durban before the first troopship.

Advices from Cape Town under date of November 3d, say that martial law has been proclaimed in the districts occupied by the British troops between the Orange River and De Aar. The Premier, W. P. Schreiner, has sent a circular to the Magistrates, and others warning all persons against statements to the effect that the parliamentary institutions of the Cape government will be lost or detrimentally affected.

He adds that the proclamation of martial law is only a matter of temporary urgency in some districts and does not compel the Burgers of the colony to participate in the "deplorable hostilities."

Prince Christian Victor, of Schleswig-Holstein, grandson of Queen Victoria and a Captain in the Kings Royal Rifles, and other officers have left Cape Town for Ladysmith to replace the dead and wounded.

The Boer prisoners have been taken on board the British cruiser Penelope. They number nine officers and 180 men. The Dutch farmers of Alvalnorth have passed a resolution, making a strong protest against the allegations of disloyalty of the Dutch in Cape Colony.

An official notice posted at the Landroost office at Vryburg October 28th, referring to the bombardment of Mafeking, says: "The big Pretoria gun wrought great destruction, but the enemy obstinately holds his own."

Other advices from Vryburg say the British flag still floats over Kuruman, but that a Boer force is about to proceed thither. The Dotaris command has been reinforced by 3,000 Boers, and has gone to Kimberley.

GREAT PROVOCATION.

Writing under date of Ladysmith, October 26th, the "Daily Telegraph" says: "The primal ground of the Boers is that the country is theirs by right of grant, conquest and occupation, and only with the unbidden consent of the Burgers shall anybody else have a voice or the right to rule in the land."

"As intelligent men, though, they declare they may be able to withstand such forces as England can send against them for a season yet, should Britain put forth her whole strength and no European Powers intervene to aid the Transvaal officials admit they must be overpowered."

"But," said Mr. Smuts, the State Attorney, to me, with the approval of Mr. Reitz and others, when you have conquered the Transvaal, it won't be another Ireland to England, I promise you. Ireland shall be as a peaceful country compared with what we shall make the Transvaal to England.

"It will be hell on earth to you of shooting and unrest. Only the biggest armies will maintain you in the country."

COLOMBIAN REVOLT.

An Insurgent Steamer Sunk by a Government Warship.

KINGSTON (Jamaica), Nov. 6.—Respectable Colombian advices just received here describe the pursuit of and of an engagement with an insurgent, convoy steamer by the Colombian cruiser Hercules, under General Rodriguez, accompanied by the steamer Colombia, having troops on board. The insurgent steamer, the Drag, was rammed and sunk, and four smaller ones were captured after a sanguinary fight.

General Cisneros, with the surviving insurgents, escaped into Rio Blanco. The insurgents lost 250 men, and the loss of the steamers is regarded as a severe blow to the insurgent cause.

Archduke Ferdinand's Marriage.

VIENNA, Nov. 6.—It is reported here that Emperor Francis Joseph has consented to a morganatic marriage between the Archduke Francis Ferdinand, son of the late Archduke Charles Louis, and his presumptive heir, the throne of Austria-Hungary and the Countess Sophia Chotek, on the condition that there be a year's delay. The Countess was formerly a maid of honor of the Archduchess Isabella. Lawyers hold that the marriage will not affect the Archduke's succession to the throne, but that his children by the marriage are excluded.

Fatal Rail Accident.

SENATOBIA (Miss.), Nov. 6.—The southbound limited passenger train on the Illinois Central Railroad, which left Memphis at 9 o'clock this morning bound for New Orleans, jumped the track at this place this afternoon with fatal results. The dead, Jack Bennett, fireman; David Downing, engineer; Memphis. The injured: Baggage-master Nat, bruised, will recover.
