

Pacific Coast Mining News.

The Oakland "Enquirer" is pleased with the reports of experts who recently examined the Empire, West Hartley, Star and Central coal mines near Antioch. It is to this effect, that 11,400,000 tons of coal are available on the properties named at a depth entirely within the reach of the shafts. It is entirely feasible to take out 20,000 tons of coal per month or about 700 per day. A supply of steam coal so abundant and so near Oakland is likely to have, as the "Enquirer" declares, an important bearing upon the industrial future of that city.

THE KENNEDY. The new shaft at the Kennedy mine had last Saturday morning reached a depth of 724 feet. It is expected to intersect the main ledge at a depth of 3,500 feet, but before that point is reached they will run west to the main ledge. It is expected to yield about the usual results. Beyond the sinking of the shaft no new improvements are contemplated for the present. Contractors are a little backward this season about getting in timbers, not employing teams enough, but the claims adjoining and up to whose line the Morning Star has been worked, and will not be caught short of either mine timbers or fuel. He has engaged additional timbers from another source, and in case the wood gives out he will burn stone coal, the difference in cost being not great.

THE MORNING STAR. Grass Valley Tidings-Telegraph: At a meeting of the stockholders of the Morning Star Gravel Mining Company, held recently, the directors voted upon a proposition to sell the mine outright, a bid having been offered by the Big Dipper Mining Company, which owns the claims adjoining and up to whose line the Morning Star has been worked. The price paid for the mine was on a basis of \$17 per share, and as there are 2,400 shares in the mine the price paid will be \$40,800. This money will be distributed among the stockholders. Besides this, there is enough in the treasury to pay each shareholder a dividend of \$7 per share, which makes the last payment they will receive from the Morning Star Company about \$24.

The Morning Star mine has a wonderful history. It has made a large number of people rich, and while for a time it was a money-making machine, it amply repaid those who held on to their stock. The mine is situated in Indian Canyon, in Placer County, near Iowa Hill, at an elevation of 2,644 feet. The gold taken out has averaged from \$7.50 to \$10 per ton, and about seventy-five tons of gold have been output. The mine employed from forty to sixty men, and about 2,000 feet of channel had been worked. Many Grass Valley people were owners in the mine, and while it has placed most of them in good circumstances several will feel the loss of the handsome monthly dividend it furnished them. The principal owners were the Coleman brothers, formerly of this city, and Lieutenant Governor Neff, who was President and Superintendent.

The Big Dipper Company, now controlled by Seymour Waterhouse, will continue to work the Morning Star as the channel of the latter mine runs into his ground. The channel is fabulously rich, and the output of his mine at the present time is over \$1,000 a day. He employs about forty or fifty men.

SETH MARTIN'S LOCATION. Nevada Transcript: Ex-Assemblyman Seth Martin had a motive in coming back to his old stamping ground the other day from John Adams, Butte County, where he is now living. Along with Colonel Jack Matlock, who came over with him, he went out this week to Mount Oro, fourteen miles east of this city, where he mined for gravel so many years with varying success, and upon their return to town last night he told the "Transcript" the purpose of the trip. He had located a ledge that has a remarkable history, and proposes to go back to Mount Oro in the spring and work it. In 1855 a man known as "Boston Charley" and his partner struck a ledge there and sinking nine feet on it found a pocket from which they gouged out \$40,000 in a very short time. The first afternoon they got \$600 and upon going deeper found one that upon being broken up in a mortar gave \$800 to the pair. The \$40,000 they got here, added to some \$36,000 they had made out of gravel, gave them such a good stake that they returned to town after covering up the ledge and sending for their partners. In 1861 Martin and some of the men who were working with him occupied the cabin they had vacated and he became familiar with the surroundings. In 1879 "Boston Charley," who was then a wealthy and prominent citizen of Illinois, came back to this county to his old stamping ground ledge. But in the twenty-odd years of his absence the appearance of the country had become transformed. The old trails were wiped out and new ones crossed in other directions. Second growth timber had shot up rapidly and other changes had taken place. The returned pioneer spent several months looking for the old location but could not find it. Before leaving he told a young man of the neighborhood about his find in '55 and gave him a roughly drawn map of the country as it then looked, indicating on the map the whereabouts of the ledge. Afterwards the young man gave Martin this map. In 1882 Martin was searching for the formation. He spent much time and money in the quest. In November of 1883 he uncovered it, discovering even the shaft, and following down to the bottom of the pocket which the pioneer discoverers had supposed was simply a pot-hole, as they knew nothing of quartz mining. Being in poor health and short of funds Martin covered up the find, saying nothing about it, and intending to reopen it when he re-

gained his health instead of making a location and performing the hundred dollars' worth of labor required to be done annually on a location. He is now strong and hearty again after years of invalidism, and he expects to get at work on his "Pot-hole" mine, as he calls it, next spring when the winter's snows are gone.

BLAST FURNACE. Keswick Miner: The new blast furnace has been completed, making altogether. It is considerably larger than the others and will give employment to many men. Work will soon be commenced on five new McDougall roasters and a tall brick chimney.

Held, that the compensation of Road Commissioners should be paid from the salary fund. The Legislature, by section 220 of the Code, has provided for the payment of the salary of all county officers out of the salary fund, and to include Supervisors as county officers, whose compensation must first be determined by the board, as well as those officers whose compensation is definitely fixed by the Act itself.

The Supervisor in acting as Road Commissioner is not the less a county officer and his duties as such Commissioner are performed by virtue of his office as Supervisor.

There is no authority for making the compensation of the Road Commissioner a charge upon the road district fund.
