A PROSPECT FOR FACTORIES.

THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE HAS ASSURANCES.

State Fair Results Now Cropping Up—Surety Companies Shy of Men Who Gamble.

The regular meeting of the Directors of the Sacramento Chamber of Commerce was held yesterday afternoon. Directors Small and Lawton each reported that he had been in conference with the agents of Eastern manufacturers with a view to securing the location in Sacramento of branch factories.

The other agent had a large exhibit in the Pavilion in September last, and sent a very flattering message to be forwarded to the Citizens' State Fair Club. He said his company had never received equal courtesies and assistance at any Fair in any part of the United States.

At the request of the Census Bureau a list of fruit growers and their addresses was obtained recently and sent to Washington. This list contains nearly 3,000 names, and was given by S. P. Maslin of the Fruit-growers' Association.

The special committee on trains was continued in service. The Committee on Exhibits, by its Chairman, T. L. Enwright, reported as follows: Sacramento, November 24th. To the Board of Directors of the Sacramento Chamber of Commerce—Gentlemen: Your Committee on Exhibits respectfully reports, in the matter of State Fair work under the auspices of the Citizens' State Fair Club, that we consider that much was accomplished, and that further efforts may be productive of even greater results.

Elizabeth S. Runyon of Courtland, has by her attorneys, Holl & Dunn, petitioned the Superior Court for letters of administration on the estate of her deceased husband, William H. Runyon. The estate consists of a half-interest in 350 acres of land, valued at about \$25,000, and not to exceed \$1,000 worth of personal property.

Margaret Pickett, guardian of the person and estate of Olive Hazel Pickett, a minor, has filed her inventory of the estate, showing it to be worth \$883.18. Judge Johnson has made an order appointing Mary Burns guardian of the persons of Marie M. and Isabelle O. Kreuzberger.

Police Sergeant Dolan and Officer Fitzgerald last night arrested Thomas Arvey for having stolen a coat from a tailor's shop on K street, near Third. He had sold the coat for twenty-five cents, and the booty was found in his pocket. The police say the prisoner is an ex-convict.

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
