BENICIA GUN PLANT. Dixon Tribune: The movement that is on foot for the purpose of petitioning Congress to establish a gun plant at Benicia is a ball that should be kept rolling. The Government has valuable properties at that place and there is no doubt the coast that is more suitable for the purpose than that afforded at Benicia. The military operations that have been in effect on the coast for the past eighteen months and the certain necessity of their increased continuance in the future is demonstrative of the value of a Pacific Coast location. If California's representatives in Congress will devote a portion of their energies toward securing an appropriation for the purpose their constituents will consider that the interests of the State have been well cared for. Benicia has already been recommended for the site by a board appointed to select a location and the proper presentation of the facts before the National Legislature will surely be productive of good fruit.

For facts of the case see S. L. O. C. Bk. v. Greenberg, 710 Cal., 301. Where a note is given to secure a certain overdraft, and the overdraft, with interest at the legal rate, after giving proper credit for several payments thereon, exceeds the amount due on the note on the date of the rendition of the verdict, the plaintiff is nevertheless entitled to no more than is due by the terms of the note itself.

Lake Shore Cattle Company, respondent; Modoc Land and Livestock Company, appellant. Order dismissing motion for new trial reversed. Order taxing costs affirmed.

The alleged motion in the engrossed statement of motion for new trial was that certain documents on file in the action had not been transcribed at length in the engrossed statement, although exact reference had been made to them as exhibits, with the direction "here insert." Held, that, as to documents on file, this was a sufficient ground for the purposes of the hearing before the trial court. Of course, in printing the transcript upon appeal to the Supreme Court the documents must be inserted at length.

G. B. Demartine, appellant; W. A. Anderson, executor, respondent. Action to recover rents. Affirmed.

If the lessee, with the knowledge and consent of the lessor, was made for the purpose of conducting an immoral house, it was unlawful and void. The court will not aid either party in an attempt to enforce such a contract. Evidence of the characters of the inmates and frequenters of the house is admissible. Section 1452, 2 Wharton's Crim. Law.

Also, evidence of the reputation of the house itself will be admitted.

The owner of a house so occupied may not shut his eyes to that which is patent to the community around him and stop his ears from that which has become notorious among his neighbors and say he has no actual knowledge.

Evidence of reputation of the house previous to a particular time conduces to show its reputation afterward, and is therefore admissible.
