SIGNAL SERVICE STATION.

LORDSBURG.

A Town That Has Seen Better Days,

NOT DEAD BY ANY MEANS.

The Mining Properties of Lordsburg Region.

F. B. L. Tells of Ledges and Veins, Drifts and Veins. Dollars and Ounces.

Twenty-two miles east of the boundary line between Arizona and New Mexico, on the Southern Pacific railroad, Grant county, New Mexico, is situated the town of Lordsburg. It had its beginning in the fall of 1883, just prior to the opening of the great southern transcontinental thoroughfare. The place is said to have received its name from one Lord, of the Tucson mercantile firm of Lord & Williams, who started the first important store here. J. P. Ownby, who is still a resident of Lordsburg, proprietor of the Ownby lodging house, a fruit and notion store and barber shop, was about the first settler. A few years ago the town was much livelier than now, and the evidence is not wanting to show that its size and number of inhabitants was also considerably larger. A number of defunct mine tributary, once in active operation but since closed down, is the chief cause of this change of aspect, though destructive fires, of which at least half a dozen which have swept the town within the past five years, have done a good share toward checking its onward march. The population is estimated at only about 300, and the business enterprises are represented by three large general stores, three lumber one blacksmith shop, one miller yard, two lodging houses, two restaurants, one barber shop, one livery stable, and four saloons. Wells, Fargo & Co. have just completed a commodious office. The Southern Pacific Co. have a round house here, and this is the terminus of freight divisions, east and west. This is also the junction of the Arizona & New Mexico railway, which terminates at Clifton, Arizona, 71 miles north-west.

The altitude is about 2,000 feet higher than Tucson, and consequently it is not hard to credit the claim that the temperature of summer is somewhat cooler than the adjacent city.

Lordsburg boasts of a weekly newspaper, called the "Western Liberal," edited and published by Don H. Keadie. It champions the interests of a large section of country, embracing the Maricopa district, to the north; Gold Hill, northeast; Shaker-pears and Pyramid mines, south; Gahaville, southwest; Stein's Pass and the Volcano district, west; and Carlisle and East Camp, north-west.

On Saturday I took a drive out to Shaker-pears and the Pyramid districts, the former is two miles south. It is an old camp, as the deserted and tumbled down condition of the adobe bars witness. Old signs posted against buildings told the character of the business carried on within in the better days gone by. Rich silver leads were discovered and located here in 1870, but slight development was effected until 1879, when a company known as the Shaker-pears took hold and operated with varying success till 1888, when it was succeeded by the Humboldt Mining Co., composed of Memphis, Tenn., capitalists. This company has operated the Superior mine pretty steadily until about two months ago, when it was decided to suspend work for the season. O. R. Smyth who is in charge of the property informed me that some changes in the machinery and working plans are contemplated, which, when accomplished, will aid very materially toward the profitable operation of the mine. The ledge is about 7 feet in width, and the average assay is estimated at 1 1/2 ounces silver, 7 10 ounces gold, and 7 per cent copper. The machinery saves the copper well, but the gold, being free, is largely washed, and it is believed that copper plates put next to the battery could effect the saving of the gold.

The Piedmont, near Carlisle, is attracting notice lately, James Tong, proprietor, having lately shipped three carloads from the mine averaging him \$200 per ton. The ore is very rich, the ledge is eighteen inches fifty feet below the surface.

The Ricoilote quarry, thirty-five miles north, is a very rich property, and has shipped many tons of this marble to Chicago. The location is somewhat inconvenient, but a mail route was opened on July 1st, and other difficulties are being removed over the route.

The property is a valuable one, as the stone takes a high polish. The Alabama, in Carlisle district, owned in part by Colonel H. B. Boone, a partner in the famous Jim Crow mine has been more successful as a property, and has shipped more stone than that of Sheriff G. Ryan county. A. T., having lately gone out to partnership with a Missouri quarry.

The Batchelor mine, Stein's party, call it a bonanza, a ledge 1 1/2 feet run, 4 to 8 on 89 ounces silver, having recently been struck at a depth of only 100 feet.

Charles Thomas is working the Patchdyki, adjoining the Batchelor.
