Nobody would be surprised to hear that Secretary Gresham has resigned. His position is just now anything but a desirable one. Instead of the vindication he thought the publication of Blount's report would bring him and the administration he finds the public much more disposed to accept the answer to the report made by the Hawaiian Minister - Mr. Thurston - as a correct story of the Hawaiian revolution. Secretary Gresham is said to be given to those who come in and who are chagrined that he is hardly contract with him a civil answer to the most trivial question. It is understood that he wanted to send Mr. Thurston his passports because he made public his answer to Blount's report, but Mr. Cleveland forbid it.

The greatest amount of wool ever imported in any single year was over the McKinley law for the year ending June 30, 1893; so Justice, Bateman & Co. point out. The imports of raw wool then were over 168,000,000 pounds, or 32 per cent more than the importations of any previous year. This refutes and disposes of the charge so often made by free-traders that it is necessary to put wool on the free list in order to give American manufacturers cheap foreign wool for mixing. They never imported so much foreign wool as under the last year of the McKinley law, the schedules of which were so wisely drawn that under it the woolen mills of the United States were employed to their full capacity, so that the entire American clip of 1892 was not only all consumed in our home market but 168,000,000 pounds of foreign wool besides.

The democrats of the ways and means committee are still undecided about a single feature of the internal revenue bill which they will have to prepare to meet the big deficiency created by their tariff bill. They wish to include the income tax, but so many vigorous protests have been filed against

it by leading democrats that it is not certain they will do.

THE Southern Pacific railroad company is deserving of a vote of thanks from the board of supervisors for the promptitude with which they paid their taxes upon the request of Treasurer Overton. There is no company or corporation in the county that does so much good, pays so much taxes or is more unthinkingly abused than the Southern Pacific railroad. In this time of depression, when money is needed to pay salaries and outstanding demands, the Southern Pacific is prompt to meet its obligations and relieve the treasury of the county that funding expenses make upon considering the amount of money paid in taxes to the county and in salaries to its employees, and the small cost it is to the county, it becomes outside of its duties as a common carrier a public benefactor.

It is certain that Mr. G. D. Johnson, of Louisiana, who was the only democratic member of the civil service commission, did not enjoy his Thanksgiving dinner. Cause why? The amount we understand is to be anywhere between \$500 and \$1000. For one, and we know that many other taxpayers are of a like way of thinking, we hope that no such appropriation will be made. To begin with neither the city or county have any money to appropriate in such a direction. If they have then let it be given to one or more of the home papers who pay taxes and help support the largest and best newspaper in the county. Give the money paper who make the fight for the city and country year in and year out, a little encouragement and financial help and they will get out a special edition that will be a credit to the paper, its promoters and their backers. It will deal with Pima county alone. It will be distinctly a Pima county paper and not a column or two hidden among a hundred other "write ups" as must necessarily be the case in a paper where the entire Pacific coast is to be extolled so much per column rate. The Examiner is a good paper. We have nothing against it, but we do sincerely protest against the payment of public money to any newspaper outside of the territory. We would like to see any of our city or county officials who have this appropriation of business under consideration, how much good can come to Tucson or Pima county from a write up that will be hidden under the glories of California as portrayed in a California newspaper. Simply none.

The republican candidates are reputable men of business and command the respect of the business element of the community. In soliciting a kindly consideration of their claims we do it on a basis of merit. They are one and all, entitled to the support of our citizens who favor a good, clean city government, and we believe they will get it. The ticket should be elected to a man.

THE TARIFF BILL

The tariff bill about which President Cleveland dwells so lovingly in his message has been before the public for a week or more, and a most careful study fails to find one single redeeming feature therein. It will, if it becomes a law, turn over the cream of the American market, the finest in the world, to European manufacturers and Canadian farmers, and all other Americans in exchange therefor are glittering promises of an increase in the foreign trade of the United States, promises which are not believed in even by those who have made them. It is admitted that free wool would put an end to the production of wool in this country and that free iron ore and coal will cause foreign coal and iron ore to be used exclusively in the neighborhood of every Atlantic seaport and that American iron ore and coal will be used nowhere except at places so far in the interior that the freight rate will allow them to compete with foreign products.

These are only specimens of the manner in which American industries have been treated by this bill. The same holds good throughout the bill. There is hardly a single industry of any consequence in the United States that is not struck at in some way. And as if that were not evil enough to be contained in a single bill this one changes the method of imposing the duty upon many of the articles which it leaves upon the dutiable list from specific to ad valorem, a system which has been condemned by nearly every secretary of the treasury the country has had as one that encourages fraud and puts a premium upon deception. Two bills are introduced in every way. While purporting to be a tariff for revenue its makers estimate that it would produce \$50,000,000 a year less than the McKinley law. It leaves the sugar bounty which the democrats claimed to oppose on constitutional grounds, and provides for its continuance eight years, dropping a quarter of a cent each year. The question naturally arises, how can a bounty of 1.34 cents be constitutional if a bounty of 2 cents was unconstitutional?

There is, however, one consoling thing about this bill, it is so utterly bad and vicious that it cannot possibly become a law in its present shape, although Mr. Cleveland's power may be sufficiently strong to force it through the house without amendment, but of that there are doubts. The non-tituents of democratic members will feel the reduction in wages and loss of employment will make themselves heard and felt as soon as they are brought to a realization of the injury to themselves that is contained in the bill. Many believe that the bill has been made public in its present shape to feel the public pulse and that the features which prove most obnoxious will later on be eliminated or modified by a democratic caucus. The report of the republican minority of the house ways and means committee, upon which work is now being pushed, promises to be a document that will make republican converts by the thousand. It will probably be ready by the last of this or the first of the week after.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The first senate session of the fifty-third congress assembled at noon. On many desks were floral tributes from admirers of their respective occupants.

Vice President Stevenson was remembered with a large basket of roses. A bunch of roses lay on the desks of Hoiph and Dougherty, champion of white metal. Stewart was recipient of a basket of beautiful maroon nells.

The galleries were well filled and a touch of color was lent to the scene by the bright winter toilets of ladies present.
