PRENDERGAST HANGED.

He was a Little Shaky but he Got There Just the Same.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 13.—There were 143 new cases of cholera and fifty-four deaths reported yesterday.

The Paris Matin today publishes a statement that the police of this city have been informed that anarchists recently left the United States for England, enroute for France, having in their possession several bombs.

According to the Matin the plot was hatched in the United States to explode bombs simultaneously in the Elysee Palace, senate chamber, a number of deputies and palaces of justice here.

CHICAGO, July 13.—Within the gloomy walls of the Cook county jail today a busy and unceasing excitement as the tide drew near when Patrick Eugene Prendergast, convicted of the murder of Mayor Carter Harrison, would expiate his crime with his life.

Prendergast rested well last night and seemed to be calm and collected. He refused, until late last night, to receive spiritual consolation, but when night came he asked for Father Muldoon.

Between six and seven o'clock Prendergast ate heartily of ham and eggs and about 9 o'clock went to the gallows. He was a trifle pale and unsteady when led to the scaffold.

He was a trifle pale and unsteady when led to the scaffold. Sheriff Gilbert gently disengaged him from making a speech. The trap was sprung and his neck was broken.

He was pronounced dead nine minutes later.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., July 12.—The assassin spent the day very quietly. Rev. Father Barry came to see him. Prendergast, when told that the priest was in jail, said:

"Well, let him come in if he wishes to, but I want it understood that I did not do it for him. If he wants to see me I will receive him."

The priest talked to Prendergast for an hour. The assassin seemed in good spirits and free from anxiety.

This afternoon Mrs. Prendergast, his mother, came. There were tears in her eyes of the sorrowing woman as she gazed at the man who had been in the jail for the strike on the Southern Railway.

Later she entered the chamber of death to take final leave of her son.

The scaffold was carried into the jail and is ready for the execution tomorrow.

DEBS--DEFEAT.

Debs Acknowledges Defeat and Urges men to get Back to Work.

THE KNIGHTS OF LABOR

Will Consider the Subject Tonight throughout the Land.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—The senate took up the legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bill.

The secretary of the treasury transmitted to the senate a request to the treasury general for an additional appropriation of \$255,000 to defray the expenses of the department growing out of the railroad strike.

DANVILLE, Ill., July 13.—Mrs. Michael Glendon and Miss Clara James were killed and an unknown man mortally wounded at Westville this afternoon by a volley fired over the heads of a crowd of striking miners by a company of militia.

The miners had been sitting in this vicinity since yesterday afternoon. During last night a number of freight cars were destroyed in the Eastern Illinois yards by incendiary fire. This morning a number of cars were wrecked at Grape Creek, on the Shelbyville branch. When the wreckage had been cleared the local passenger train proceeded without molestation until Westville was reached. When it stopped there it was surrounded by a crowd of militia and was held up. A telegram to Danville, and a special train with a company of state troops started at once for the scene.

About five miles from Westville a large crowd of militia had collected and upon the approach of the train bearing the militia began warlike demonstrations. Several pistol shots were fired at the soldiers, who returned the fire, wounding a number of the strikers.
