Frank Webber, whose ranch at the head of Sabino creek, is in close proximity to the summit of Mount Lemmon, is endeavoring to arouse sufficient interest among our people to enable him to construct a trail up the mountain side via his ranch. Mount Lemmon is in the center of one of the best hunting and fishing grounds in the territory, and is an admirable summer resort. The difficulty of reaching it has acted as a bar to numbers of visitors heretofore. The only way in which it is at all accessible is by a long, arduous route via Oracle. The proposed trail will bring it within eighteen or twenty miles of the city, and if the route be completed, crowds will visit the place each summer. It is understood that members of the university faculty have guaranteed \$75 towards building the trail, the city contributing the remainder. Mr. Webber estimates at only about \$200. He should have no difficulty in securing the remainder of the amount in a very short time.
