Italian Affairs.—The Pope. Like many of the greatest men that have ever lived in reforming the world, and in establishing the rights of men, the present Pope is not what is called a "man of genius"—that is of intellectual genius.

By the Britannia's news, it is stated that the Foreign Secretary of the English Government, Lord Palmerston, has notified the Austrians of his determination to consider any further attempt on the part of the latter to menace the Pope, as "a declaration of war" against the Papal Anathema.

Protection of the British, however, will be an effectual shield to the Pope, in his moves towards reform. It now remains to be seen how far his Eminence will proceed in these reforms, and how they will affect the interest of the Italian people.

Washington Correspondence.

WASHINGTON, March 13, 1848. The business before Congress is accumulating much more rapidly than it is disposed of in the House of Representatives, and also in the Senate.

One of these charges is that "the amount of available money in the Treasury, and the amount estimated as available, does not exceed more than five millions the amount authorized." In all these statements there are great errors somewhere.

Some of the speeches made in the House have incidentally touched upon the Treaty. Mr. Smith, of Conn., Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations, made a very interesting speech on the subject of the present session of Congress, and the question of the ratification of the Treaty.

Some twenty new clerks are also to be paid for in the charge incident to the Court, and about ten thousand dollars for the same purpose, including outfit and salary for a large class of Affairs to the Papal States.

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The Treaty of Peace.

All sorts of accounts continue to come from various sources, of the probable fate, in the United States Senate, of Mr. Trist's treaty with Mexico.

One thing seems to be acknowledged, however, by all; and that is, that the more the treaty is examined, and the uglier it appears, the more we are inclined to believe that it will be rejected.
