SHIP ISLAND A PORT OF ENTRY.—On the 7th inst., in the U. S. Senate, Mr. Dix, from the Committee on Commerce, reported with amendments the House bill, to make Ship Island, near New Orleans, a port of entry.

WASHINGTON CORRESPONDENCE OF CRESCENT. The Senate closed its weekly work by killing the bill which passed the House early in March, authorizing the Judges of the Supreme Court to hold a summer term, with the view of clearing the docket.

WASHINGTON, April 5, 1848. The Legislative proceedings have been interrupted for two days on account of the death of James Augustus Black, a new and much esteemed member of the House.

THE funeral service took place to-day from the Hall of the House of Representatives, where it was delivered by the Rev. Mr. Butler. The remains are temporarily committed to the Congressional Burying Ground, but will soon be removed to the home of the deceased.

MR. Black's death makes the ninth among the members of the present Congress—four from among the members of the House, and five from among the members of the Senate. The occurrence is alike unusual and impressive.

THE meeting of the members of the Press on Monday night was characterized by great public spirit. It was called to order by the Rev. Mr. Butler, and the Rev. Mr. Butler presided, assisted by a large number of Vice-Presidents and Secretaries.

THE Circular and District Court of the U. S., Judge Camp presiding, for two days have been engaged upon the trial of the case of the United States vs. George M. Dallas, Vice President of the United States and President of the Senate.

THE day was devoted to the subject, and until the decision of the President is rendered, the case will remain in suspense. The President is sending out a Charge d'Affaires to Guatemala, in view of the report, or rather the revival of ancient claims made by the British Government to the Mosquito tribe of Indians, and the land they possess.

MR. Benton presented a paper from Col. Fremont containing some correspondence, from which it appeared that the Colonel's resignation has been accepted by the President.

MR. Abertson, from the Committee on Finance, reported back, with sundry amendments, the bill for the relief of the House-making appropriations to fulfill treaty stipulations with the several Indian tribes.

MR. Westcott introduced a bill for the relief of bona fide settlers under the act for the armed occupation of Florida.

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TELEGRAPHIC DISPATCH. MOBILE, April 16-5 o'clock, p. m.—Cotton in New York, on the 11th inst., declined one-eighth to one-fourth of a cent per pound. No additional news here.

LIBERTY IN CUBA.—The Captain General of Cuba, Gen. Roncal, prohibited the sale of the Correo de Ultramar, a Paris paper, which contained the late news of the French revolution, and threatened to banish the agent if he sold any more numbers.

THE match for \$2,000 between "Stagnano" and "Lady Sutton," was decided on the 5th inst. on the Union Course, Long Island, (N. Y.) the latter winning in two straight heats.

THE Irish Confederates met at Boston, on last Tuesday night, to express their sympathy for France.
