SUSPICIOUS PLAY SOMEWHERE.—The Mineral Bank of Maryland has issued a circular, saying: "Its account with Messrs. Lake & Co. has been fortunately adjusted. It has now resumed its business, and will, as heretofore, accommodate the business public to the extent of its means."

DEATH OF A SENATOR ELECT.—Wm. H. More, of Brunswick, Me., State Senator—elect of that district, died suddenly on the 6th inst.
