

YUCATAN AND IMPERIAL YUCATAN.

The Cruz Andros of the 3d contains intelligence from Yucatan. The difficulties between the hostile races have been settled, the whites conceding every point demanded by the Indians. The following letter, dated Campechy, April 25th: Dear Sir—I take this opportunity of communicating to you the most important news. The country becomes every day in a worse condition; and if, in four months, foreign aid does not arrive, we will not survive. The negotiations have been concluded with the Chief, Pat, who will give us momentarily. The treaty runs as follows: At the instance of his friends, and against his will, he has agreed to give up his arms, and to accept of the Government of Yucatan. He is to be Governor, during the absence of the Indians. Twenty-five hundred men, taken from the Indians previous to the war, are to be returned to Pat. All debts due by the Indians are to be remitted. The uncultivated lands which had been sold by the Government are to be common property. There shall not be any personal contribution in Yucatan. The rights of the Indian chiefs, however, deny that Pat has any right to make this treaty. His troops are not committing the worst sort of crimes. This army, it is thought, will soon take to the hills, and will be besieging. It is thought that Pat says he has sent a messenger to other parts of the Republic of Mexico to procure instructions—and they having returned, from this statement, accepted the present terms. (This seems to corroborate the intimations made previously in our columns, that the Indian struggle in San Luis Potosi and Guadalajara, was connected with the Yucatan revolt.)

REPORTED ARRIVAL OF LOUIS PHILIPPE.—The Frigate's dispatch yesterday announced "positively" the arrival of Louis Philippe and family at New York in the steamship America. We shall have to wait for further intelligence before crediting a travel and imparting a piece of intelligence.

The new bank, lately established in Texas, by virtue of an obsolete charter, has had its property taken away. A crash is expected shortly. People of Texas, stand firm under.
