

The Press in Mexico. Soon after the conclusion of the armistice the Mexican authorities at Vera Cruz summoned the editors of the Free American to appear before them for having spoken disrespectfully of them in some articles which appeared in that paper. The editors denied the right of the Mexicans to hold them responsible, and the case was laid before the American authorities, by whom the following note was addressed to the Alt Alcaldé of Vera Cruz:

COEY ROOM OF LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR: Vera Cruz, May 24, 1848. I have had the honor to receive your statement, relating to the case of the Free American, in answer to a note which I addressed to you on the 14th inst. I will take this occasion to state that any attempt to persecute the press for its opinions is contrary to the spirit of the American Constitution, and that the measures which will be taken by the Court in this respect shall be in accordance with the principles of the American Constitution.

THE POST OFFICE ROBBERIES.—In addition to the other robberies of the mail lately detected between Hartford and Boston, a letter was mailed at Hartford and directed to Boston, on the 2d of May, containing \$400, viz: four \$100 bank notes. This letter was stolen, and the robber presented the bills at the Suffolk Bank, Boston, and other banks were given for them.

ACQUITTA.—The trial of the persons arrested at Providence, R. I., on suspicion of having committed a robbery of \$6000 on board the steamboat Bradford Durie, resulted in the honorable and entire acquittal of R. P. Kidder and Edward Durie, who were proven to have been gentlemen of character and honest.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRES.—The spacious chocolate mill at Dorchester, Mass., belonging to Walter Hall, together with all the valuable machinery, were destroyed by fire on the night of the 25th ult. The fire started from a lamp, and spread rapidly, and the factory of Mr. Alford, in Hitchcockville, Conn., was destroyed by fire on the 26th ult., with great loss of contents. Loss several thousand dollars. The extensive tannery belonging to Austin Strong, in Fallburg, N. Y., was entirely consumed by fire on the 24th ult. Loss \$82,000.—Insured.

Soldiers Coming Home.
Now that peace has been declared, we may expect in the course of a few weeks the return of thousands of our valiant soldiers. That many will come back with blanching cheeks and shattered limbs, there can be no doubt, for these are the uncounted ornaments too often earned in the deadly trade of war. Still, war is not without its blessings. The brave warriors of "the land of the free, and the home of the brave," have taught a lesson to our once haughty neighbor, that time itself cannot extinguish. Not only have we taught them our prowess in deeds of battle, but also of our gentleness when the storm of war was over. The emblem of our beloved country, the majestic eagle, whilst in anger dashes the lightning and turns a deaf ear to the clarion-like sound of the thunder of the storm, but when that storm is over all is peace, content, forgiveness. Those pale-checked soldiers—they will come home—each of them with a laurel wreath upon his brow—each with a knowledge that he has battled for his country's glory. The American blood that has been spilled in Mexico will serve to fertilize her soil and render it more prenable to the seeds of liberty, which, thanks to our institutions, are fast being implanted. When the great teachers of the rights of man step upon their homeward shores, let not New Orleans be backward in doing them honor and justice. We call upon the various military departments of the city to see that whilst the poor soldiers remain here, that their persons may be protected from those calamities, both personal and pecuniary, that are too often incidental to a soldier's life. The brave fellows have taken care of our honor as a nation abroad, and it behooves us now to take care of them when they shall return.

No COUNCIL.—There being no quorum present last evening, the First Municipality members did not hold their regular session.

THE COURTS.—Yesterday it was impossible to obtain a single item that was worth reading from any of the higher courts. The waves of the Gulf of law, that in the business season continually clash against each other, were yesterday still, and save a few legal ripples, the discord was stilled. The judges sat calmly in their chairs—the clerks wrote in peace, and directed their eyes to prosperity, whilst the deputy marshals, meditating the probability of things to come. Patience, Prudence, and Politics presided over the destinies of yesterday.

YESTERDAY.—Dogs and days are sometimes considerably alike. Now and then you will find a day that like a gentle spout will kneel at your feet, and even with its gentle breezes lick your hand. Then again you have your nice little happy days, when the skies are garnished with milk-colored clouds, and the air is as soft as a feather bed. Then again your terrier days, when the clouds snap and snarl as though they thought no more of you than a big fat rat. Yesterday, however, was a kind of a surly bull-dog kind of a day. The clouds looked as gloomy as a widow in black, and the thunder muttered and growled like pent up mastiffs who had not been fed for more than a week. The clerk of the weather, however, getting tired of the manner in which the sky conducted itself, about 6 o'clock in the evening discharged the clouds, which, by the bye, shed millions upon millions of diamond tears upon this blessed earth. We had a very handsomely done up shower, but at 10 o'clock last night, the stars were afraid to venture out for fear of catching cold. "Sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof."

THE THREE FURIES.—Bridget Delaney, Julia Kelly, and Mary Owen, were yesterday arrested at the request of Mrs. Brooklin, who charged them individually and collectively, with having stolen from her the enormous sum of three dollars in dimes and pennies. The three ladies accused looked as if they had lived amongst thorn bushes all their lives, drank vinegar instead of coffee as a beverage, made the husbands as happy as men could be supposed to be whilst walking on brickly years. Mrs. Owen was sent to the workhouse, and the other two ladies were discharged.

HOT BLOOD.—A young man by the name of H. Petepain, was yesterday evening arrested on the charge of wishing, or, at all events, consenting to fight a duel with Mr. Dupleve. Recorder Genois held the former to bail, and a warrant was issued for the arrest of the latter.

RIOT AND ASSAULT.—W. R. Hays, an officer of the Second Municipality, yesterday accused a man by the name of Edward Johnson with having endangered his life, by striking him on the head with a club. Hays seeing that a mob of more than one hundred persons had collected, went in for the purpose of extending the peace, which he was assailed by the prisoner, in the manner above described. Had the blow have been inflicted with a little more force, it certainly would have killed him. The assailant of Hays, Edward Johnson, was yesterday examined before Recorder Baldwin, and sent to the First District Court.

A PAIR OF THEM.—Elizabeth Heath yesterday made a affidavit before Recorder Genois that on Sunday night last, she and her sister, Mary Wilson, were sitting peacefully in their room, when a man by the name of Henry Thompson, who was the well known sign of a very dear friend, she opened the door, when lo and behold, she met the angry face of the lovely but notorious Fanny Smith, who immediately gave her charming rattle two consecutive pats with a small finger. Fanny then ran to her door, and having attempted to shoot her, as Sir Lucius O'Trigger says—"It's a very pretty quarrel as it stands."

INQUEST.—Coroner Spedden yesterday held an inquest on the body of an inn named DAVID WILSON, nearly ten years, who was found drowned in the Mississippi river, nearly opposite St. Joseph street in the Second Municipality. Verdict in accordance with facts.

SENT DOWN.—About a week ago, we saw a handsome looking woman, with hair disheveled, and with pale, but lovely face. Come into the Police office of the 2d Municipality, she told us that her name was Recorder Genois, and from her own story, seemed in fact to be "more sinned against than sinning." Mrs. Delaney, who was her name, was yesterday brought before Recorder Baldwin on the charge of having, whenever opportunity offered, sold a "negro" in alk, or a half worth of gin to any one who might be near the same, in spite of law and license. She accused a lady by the name of Mrs. Quinn, with having attempted to smash her over the head with a water pitcher; but she in turn was accused of having sold spirituous liquor in small quantities without a license. Mrs. Quinn was discharged, and Mrs. Delaney, who looked like the Queen of Sheba in disguise, was sent to the First District Court.

STABbing.—On the morning of the 26th of May last, a man by the name of John Brown, was found lying in the act of breaking open the door of the house of Mr. Dupleve in the Third Municipality. The proprietor of the house attempted to arrest him, when Brown drew a knife and dangerously stabbed him in the hand. The accused was yesterday examined before Recorder Genois, and afterwards sent to the First District Court.

THE THROAT CUTTING CASE.—It will be recalled that some few days ago we published an account of a colored man by the name of John Formanin, a barber by trade, having cut the throat of a respectable white person, named William Springer. Formanin yesterday appeared before Recorder Genois, and was admitted to bail in the sum of \$1000, which he deposited before the First District Court. Mr. Springer is declared to be entirely out of danger, although his wound is extremely painful.

SHIPWRECKS IN THE PACIFIC.

—Letters from Honolulu, Sandwich Islands, the 1st of March, received at New Bedford, report the loss of the Maria Helen, with a cargo of oil and whale-bone valued at \$80,000, (only \$5000 insured), bound for that port, and the Bremen ship Mozart, (partly insured in Wall street, New York), with 3300 barrels whale oil; both on Christmas island, in the Pacific, in December and January last.

ASSASSIN DISCOVERED.—Two men in New York, in consequence of disclosures made by themselves whilst intoxicated at a house of ill fame, have been arrested on the supposition that they are implicated in the murder of a man named Meighan, found in a dying state in the streets of New York one night last winter, who after he had left a dance house. They had been attached to a theatre.

MURDER.—In Cincinnati on the 27th ult., a man named Daniel Keenah, was killed by a person of the name of Christian Fleming, a cooper by trade. Fleming was in a state of intoxication at the time. He stabbed his victim in several places, and then escaped, and had not been arrested. Keenah was said to have been a very worthy and respectable man.

LIBERAL.—The congregation of Grace church, New York, contributed \$628.50 to the family of George Kerr, lately killed at a fire in that city.
