Second Municipality.—Discharged.—Andrew Kenten, charged by Mrs. Hannah Denman with stealing a silver watch some nights since from the dining-table, in her house on the Levee, was yesterday examined before Recorder Baldwin and discharged, the evidence failing to support the accusation.

Berny Fitzsimmons, brought to the watchhouse on Monday night, on the accusation of Stephen Conity, of having stolen his cow, was also discharged without examination; as it appeared by the voluntary confession of the complainant, that the only ground for the charge was that he found Fitzsimmons milking the cow, and it appeared that only a slight compensation for the trespass of the animal in feeding on hay, the accused had on his premises to feed his horse.

Serious Affray between Youngs.—Edward McCusky, a youth about 18 or 19 years of age, was brought to the watchhouse on Monday night at the request of Mr. W. H. Dunas, who happened to see him inflict a violent blow with a stick on a lad named Francis Faby, about 13 or 14 years old, on St. Charles street. Faby yesterday made affidavit to this fact, and further deposed that the blow knocked him down and deprived him of his senses, and that it was inflicted with intent to kill. The case is to be examined to-day, and the Recorder required \$1500 bail for the appearance of the accused.

We learn that the affray grew out of a number of youths coming from Lafayette to New Orleans, on the night it occurred, to fight another party of opposite political opinions. They had some fighting, and this affray followed. It is to be regretted that party rancor is carried so far as to imbue our youths with such a spirit.

The Hall Case.—We yesterday mentioned that a white man named Newell Hall, and a negro named Tony Clark, were arrested on Monday evening, and charged with attempting to defraud Mr. W. W. White, an Exchange Broker on Camp street, of a large sum of money. P. E. Jordan, the clerk and agent of Mr. White, yesterday made affidavit that Hall made the attempt on a representation that he was \$5000 belonging to Tony, who is alleged to be a slave of Mr. Andrews, residing in Warren county, Mississippi, in the hands of Messrs. Brown & Johnson of Vicksburg, which representation the deponent believes Hall made with a knowledge it was false. The sum sought to be obtained on this alleged pretense was \$3000. The case was fixed for the 31st inst., sufficient time being allowed Hall to obtain evidence from Vicksburg, which he says is material to prove his innocence. Both he and the negro were remanded to jail to await examination.
