DROWNED.—The Coroner was called on yesterday to hold an inquest on the body of a white man, found drowned in the river, opposite the square between Ursoline and Hospital streets, in the First Municipality. His name is not known. He was very well dressed, wearing a white cotton shirt, drawers, striped waistcoat, black striped tweed frock coat, fine boots, and fine kid gloves. He had black hair, small whiskers, and a goatee. The Coroner, supposing that he might have met his death by foul play, called in a physician to examine the body, but no marks of violence were found, and the jury returned a verdict of "found drowned."

Mr. John Cook slipped in good order on board ship York, on last night, with an oval on the head, and a, on each end, with an oval on the same. The following was written on a piece of paper found torn: Henry Passon, Broadfield, St. No. (paper torn here) Boston.

ACCIDENT.—We learn that two men, working on the bridge, at Algiers, fell from the masthead to the deck, and were both severely, if not dangerously, injured. One of them, we understand, is named Terrence. The name of the other, we did not hear.

FIRST MUNICIPALITY.—Vagrancy.—Joseph Laouze was yesterday sent before the First District Court, by Recorder Genois, to be tried for vagrancy.

PICKPOCKET.—Wm. Harney, accused of picking the pocket of a drunken man lying on the Levee, on Wednesday night, and caught in the act, it is alleged, was yesterday examined, and committed for trial.

Breach of Trust.—A man named Stanford was yesterday brought to the First Municipality guard-house by the Second Municipality police, by whom he was arrested on a charge of breach of trust.

SECOND MUNICIPALITY.—Assault and Battery. Mary Glenn was yesterday examined before Recorder Baldwin, on a charge of beating a Mrs. Melville, and was sent before the First District Court, for trial.

Concealing Property.—A woman named Mary Sinclair, living on Girod street, was yesterday arrested at the request of a Peter Miller, who charges her with "concealing a quilt and mattress in her premises," belonging to him.

THIRD MUNICIPALITY.—Stolen Property Found. J. B. Trump appeared before Recorder Seizeuxon yesterday and made affidavit that he believed a lot of tools were stolen from his premises several days since, and that he had reason to suspect they were concealed in the house of one Michael Koffman, residing at the corner of Levee and Magazine sts. A search warrant was issued, and the property was found in the house.

SAD ACCIDENT.—A little negro boy, belonging to Mr. Monian, of Baton Rouge, was dreadfully mangled on Monday last, by the discharge of a cannon, while assisting to fire a salute. His arms, hands and face are so injured as to render him entirely useless hereafter.

HYDROPHOBIA.—A boy died of hydrophobia, near Hoston, twelve days after being bitten by a mad dog.

The steambot Tobacco Plant arrived at St. Louis on the 23d ult., with a portion of the machinery of the ill-fated steambot Sea Bird, blown up by gunpowder about a year since at Cape Girardeau. She brought up one of the cylinders found several hundred yards from the wreck; a boiler is still embedded in the sand, nearly half a mile from the scene of the terrible explosion; and other fragments of the machinery and boat lie scattered in the river and on shore for several hundred yards, in every direction. A bathtub under the charge of the clerk of the late steambot Plough Boy, also arrived with the largest portion of her machinery, furniture, &c., on board.

FEMALE OPERATIVES.—A number of respectable young women, who are tailorsesses, have taken a shop in Liberty street, New York, and have set up for themselves.

A suit for breach of marriage promise was tried at Buffalo on the 24th, between Mary Ann Campbell and Charles Jones, which resulted in a verdict for the plaintiff of \$503. The defendant was tried for seducing the fair Mary Ann, and was nuled in another verdict of \$500.

A little girl, four years old, was choked to death on Saturday, at Pittsburg, by a button which accidentally got into its throat.

MORE FORGED NOTES.—Since the conviction of Miller, at Boston, of \$80,000 in forgeries, the Advertiser says, two new notes, for \$2,500 each, have been discovered. Mr. Belknap, on whom the forgeries were committed, offers to divide \$10,000 with the holders, which most of them agree to as a compromise.

An Irishman was killed and another severely wounded by an accident on the new railroad near Theford, Vt.

THE BRIDGEPORT BANK DEFAULTER.—The teller of the Bridgeport Bank, young Beach, it is ascertained, went out to England in the Hermann. His defalcation is \$17,000, and not one-half the surplus of the bank. An agent has been sent after Beach.

Barbara Ann Cosson was convicted at Philadelphia, on the 25th, of adultery.

FIRE AND ACCIDENT.—The extensive hat manufactory of Wm. H. Beebe & Co., 185 Broadway, New York, was set on fire by the explosion of some part of the steam apparatus, on the 24th, occasioning a loss of stock of \$2000 to \$4000, and horribly burning Mr. B.'s face and hands.

A keg of powder exploded in Ernestus Hubbard's store, Montpellier, Vt., a few weeks since, and some sixteen persons were more or less injured. One, Ezra Bancroft, has since died; the rest will recover.

James Griffin, a returned volunteer, was found drowned at Norfolk on the 24th.

BORN TO DEATH.—In Providence, on the 23d ult., an old house, occupied by a number of Irish families, was partially burnt. An infant son of Patrick Feely, 11 weeks old, was left in bed by his mother, and was found burned to death.

Twenty-one boys, employed in the Perry Mills, at Newport, R. I., were arrested the other day for assaulting the foreman.

LONG DROUGHT.—We were shown a letter the other day, from Sussex county, Del., which stated that there had not been a rain in that region since July, and that the corn was lighter than the writer had ever before seen.—Centinel (MS) Sentinel.

VERMONT.—Carlos Coolidge, the new Governor of Vermont, on Thursday, 19th ult., transmitted to the Legislature, now in session, his first annual message. It is a brief, well-expressed, business-like paper, yet comprehensive enough to embrace all the prominent topics of legislation worthy of notice, and especially that of education. "Education for all," says the message, "is now demanded. Inquisitive men not long since found out that there is no such thing as that which literary folks have called the 'vulgar mind.' The artificial distinctions between the common schools and the colleges of Vermont cannot and will not quietly submit to the extension of slavery over United States territory now free.
