FOURTH DISTRICT COURT.—A decision of some importance was made by the Judge of the Fourth District Court, last week, in the case of the liquidator of the Atchafalaya Bank, against one of the stockholders.

CONVICTION.—The Petty (N. S.) Chronicle of the 26th ult. reports that a man named McFadyen has been tried and found guilty of the murder of a young man named Carr, with whom he was travelling in company.

BURNED TO DEATH.—James Holland, an aged farmer of Chester county, Pa., lost his life by his barn burning—he being unable to escape after he discovered the flames.

CANAL ACCIDENT.—A packet boat in the Pennsylvania canal, on the 31st ult. between Beaver and Mercer, struck a rock and sunk in twenty feet water.

A PIONEER GONE.—Robert Stewart, the distinguished western pioneer, died at Chicago on the 28th ult. In his early life he was extensively engaged in the fur business with John Jacob Astor.

HIGHWAY ROBBERY.—Elijah Wiley and John Woods were arrested on Saturday night, for knocking down in the streets, in the First Municipality, a colored man named Lee, and robbing him of a small sum of money he had in his pocket.

"TAKING A HORSE."—A man named William Ward, was arrested yesterday by the police of the First Municipality, at the request of Jacques Bernard, who charges him with "taking his horse."

ABOUT TO FIGHT A DUEL.—Alfred Wiltz was yesterday arrested by the First Municipality Police, an affidavit having been filed, that he intended to fight a duel with Gaudy.

CHICKEN STEALING.—Hamilton, a slave belonging to Mr. Lorenzo, was brought to the Second Municipality watch-house, on Saturday night, at the request of Mr. Nichols, who accuses him of stealing chickens.

DESKERS.—Thos. Warrington, Thos. Devine and Robert Prentiss, were yesterday arrested in the Second Municipality, as deserters from a British ship, the name of which we have not learned.

FROM CORPUS CHRISTI.—We received last evening the Corpus Christi Star of the 24th ult., from which we make the following extracts:

INDIANS.—A party of Germans passed through here a day or two ago and reported that the other body of Indians had been attacked on the other side of the San Antonio river, by a company of Texas Rangers.

HORRIBLE.—David Frew having murdered his wife and another woman named Jane Norman, then set fire to the house.

A large and daring robbery was committed at Detroit, Mich., on the 25th ult. The broker and exchange office of E. Prentiss was entered, and a large amount of money, in gold, silver, and bank notes, internal improvement warrants and soldier bounty land warrants, deposited in the safe, nearly all the contents were taken.

A horrible case of destitution came under the cognizance of the New York Commissioners of Emigration, on the 1st inst.—a poor, half-naked woman, just arrived from Ireland, wandering through the streets, bearing in her arms the dead body of her infant, which had expired the day before from exposure and want of nourishment to sustain nature.

DEATH OF JOSEPH P. WELLS.—For several days past we have heard a rumor of the death of Capt. Wells, but we could not learn any of the particulars until a private letter was placed into our hands yesterday, and although we learn from it that the cause of his death was cholera, we have no doubt that the cause of his death was cholera.

ROBBERY ON THE FRONTIER.—It was with no little satisfaction that we received advice a few days ago, of the capture of a gang of robbers in Star county. The Chief Justice being advised of their whereabouts, called upon the citizens for assistance, and with a heavy force will rally around him, and arrested eleven men, who were taken to the county seat and confined, and will be kept in custody until the meeting of the District Court.

LAREDO.—A party of gentlemen who arrived from Laredo yesterday, state that they met a number of robbers going from San Antonio to Laredo, and that among them was a member of Captain Sutton's company of Rangers. The latter informed them, and that the report of their having had a fight with some Indians, mentioned by us in another place, was without foundation.

The murder recently committed on the San Antonio river, which were first attributed to the Indians, now appear to have been committed by a party of Mexicans from Calver's Ranch, who were seen to have been engaged in the murder of the murdered man. The Mexicans state that they pursued a party of Indians who met on their route, and that they took the clothing from them; but this story did not appear to be generally credited.

FROM MONTEVIDEO.—Earthquakes, a Battle, &c. Accounts from Montevideo to August 26, describe a succession of earthquakes which occurred in all the vicinity of Montevideo, and to the distance of at least eighteen leagues on land, on the 9th, 15th and 18th of August. In the vessels under the port, and in some further distant, the earthquake was felt by a sort of tremulous motion. The following account was received from the Corro:

"Last night, at half past 6, we had an earthquake which shook the solid fortress and its edifice. It was accompanied by a noise like that of the discharge of a piece of artillery, gradually decreasing till the end. Its duration was about 65 seconds."

It does not appear that any damage resulted from these commotions in the districts heard from. It is not improbable that more serious convulsions occurred on the western coast of South America. It is remembered that a very perceptible shock was experienced in New York city and vicinity on the evening of September 8th.

A letter dated August 23d, says: "On the 18th instant, the town of Colonia fell into the hands of the rebels, under the orders of General Oribe, through the treachery of the garrison, who opened the gates for the entry of the enemy in the night, when the inhabitants were in their beds."

The alarm became general, and many persons fled toward the water, with the view of swimming to the shore, and the safety of their lives, seventy of whom are reported to have drowned in the attempt. The carrion of Colonia having now fallen, Montevideo is the only spot throughout the province in the possession of the acknowledged government of the Oriental Republic of the Uruguay.

The President officially recognizes Louis Becker, Consul-General of the State of Texas, as one of the National Colleges of France.

Mr. William Burney, formerly of Columbia, has been appointed Professor of English Literature in one of the National Colleges of France.

John B. Dillon, the Irish patriot and exile, arrived at New York from Sligo, on the 1st inst.

PARAGUAY.—The Steamship Niagara from Boston for Liverpool, on the 28th ult. was captured by the privateers of the Republic of Paraguay, and the crew and passengers were taken to the city of Asuncion.
