STEAMER WYANDOTT SUNK.—We heard from Captain Moore, of the steamer Wyandott, that the steamer Wyandott, Captain Yore, from St. Louis for this port, with a full cargo, on the evening of the 20th instant, about 7 o'clock, while rounding to at a wood-yard, about fifteen miles above Vicksburg, sunk to nearly her boiler-deck, drowning, it is supposed, from twenty to thirty persons. The principal part of her cargo was a total loss.

DISASTER BY SEA.—Captain Smith, of the steamship Palmstein, which arrived yesterday, made the following report: Wednesday, November 22, at 3 P. M., twelve miles N. E. of the bar (Galveston) fell in with the schooner Charles L. Gager, Captain Hurd, with main mast gone and water-logged—crew had been lashed to the wreck five days. Towed her in tow, and at 4 o'clock 45 minutes, got her over the bar, and gave her in charge of the pilot, Captain L. M. Hicchock. She was from Pensacola, loaded with lumber, and bound to Managosa Bay. She was down in a north or north-east wind, and had to cut away her main-mast to let the vessel upright, the sea making a clean breach over her and filling her with water. The crew were five days lashed to the taffrail without provisions or water—seven persons in all. The Captain abandoned her, and Captain Smith towed her into Galveston harbor.

THE "MAJOR W. S. BLISS" AFFAIR.—The New York Tribune has received a communication, with the following statement of the real merits of the case: "It appears that a Major W. S. Bliss is attached to the Engineer Corps, Company A, of West Point, and while Mr. B. was on a visit to Boston, he put up at the Marlborough Hotel, and signed his name with 'U. S. A.' after it was unquestionably his right to do, under existing circumstances. The error, first promulgated by a Boston Journal, stands corrected."

THE NEW YORK BAR.—Some gentlemen of the Bar lately made a statement, by which it appears that their aggregate net receipts are so small as to not furnish over \$250 a year in at least one-third of the members of the legal profession. There are over 500 attorneys in New York, and it is believed 300 of these on an average receive a year.
