GREAT FIRES IN NEW YORK.

In reference to the destructive fires in New York, mentioned in our telegraphic dispatches lately, a letter written to the Philadelphia Inquirer says: We were visited last night by several dreadful fires, which destroyed an immense amount of property, and a great deal of animal life.

The fire broke out in Murphy's stage establishment, on the corner of 27th street and 3d avenue, and destroyed one hundred and fifty horses, twenty-six stages, twenty-five sleighs, a factory attached to a Methodist church on 27th street public school No. 15, several small dwelling houses, two good frame dwellings, and St. Barnabas Protestant Episcopal church.
