A CLOCK HEARD THREE HUNDRED MILES.—It is known that experiments have been making for some time, on the telegraph line between Philadelphia and Cincinnati, by the distinguished astronomer, Sears C. Walker, and Prof. Locke.

AN INTERESTING CASE.—The U. S. Circuit Court, now in session at Pittsburg, was engaged nearly all week before last in the trial of the case of the Lessee of Watson vs. Prescott.

SILVER GRADE.—In accordance with an ancient custom in England, the worshipful lady of the Mayor of Liverpool was recently complimented with the gift of an elegant and massive silver cradle, for a new "responsibility" with which she had presented his majesty.

A NOVEL CHARITY.—About five hundred dollars were raised by voluntary contribution by the whigs of Rochester, and expended in purchasing and cooking four hundred chicken pies, five hundred and fifty mince pies, five hundred and fifty large loaves of bread, forty fifty barrels of apples, one hundred and fifty turkeys, geese and chickens, besides a necessary supply of biscuit, cakes, etc.
