U. S. TREASURY - The correspondence of the Baltimore Sun gives the following as the estimates to be submitted with Secretary Walker's report: WEY ESTIMATES.

MOBILE GAS WORKS - The fire in the gas works was not so destructive as was supposed. None of the material part of the utensils essential to the manufacture of the gas was destroyed, and last night the city was supplied without interruption.

CLOSING OF THE CANALS - The Albany Evening Journal of Wednesday week, says that Commissioners have determined to draw the water from the canals on the 9th December, even though they should be not previously closed by the weather.

NAVY - The U. S. steamer Water Witch, Geo. M. Totten, Lieut. Commanding, arrived at Norfolk on the morning of the 1st. Left Pensacola 12th inst., touched at Key West and stopped four days and a half; touched at Charleston and stopped two days and a half. She sailed the same afternoon for Washington.

METHODIST CONFERENCE - The Conference of the Louisiana Methodist Episcopal Church will hold its next annual session at Baton Rouge, commencing the 27th inst.

The weather in this section for the past eight or ten days has been very lachrymose, and consequently has considerably retarded the operations of planter in gathering their crops. The sugar planters are busy grinding - all having secured their cane by windowing. Large quantities of sugar manufactured by the Messrs. Perkins and W. Frost, a few days past in West Feliciana, which will compare in every respect with any of the same article cultivated in the State.

Mr. DeWitt, of the Committee on Unfinished Business, reported "An Act to authorize the Treasurer of the State to refund to the Parish of Terrebonne moneys advanced into the Treasury upon the extra tax." The rules were dispensed with, it was read three times and passed.

A written message from the Governor was received. The Senate was informed that the Governor had approved and signed "An Act for the relief of Antonio Alfred Hebert alias Antonio Landry, &c." and an Act to suspend the privilege of the members of the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana and Officers thereof, and the certificate expenses of the Legislature."

Mr. Massell White, of the Committee on Finance, reported "An Act to authorize the Auditor of Public Accounts to suspend and annul the claim of the State to the taxes on a certain parcel of ground in the town of Independence, in the Parish of St. Landry." The rules were dispensed with, it was read three times and passed.

The Clerk of the House informed the Senate of the concurrence of the House in the "An Act to emancipate Marion Augustus Andrews." "An Act to amend an act, entitled an act to fix the time at which the terms of Court in the several parishes of the State shall be held, the Parish of Orleans excepted." "An Act to amend an act, entitled an act to incorporate the Methodist Episcopal Church in the town of Baton Rouge, Parish of East Baton Rouge, approved January 25th, 1848."

An act to provide for the sale of State lands in Free School Lots, in the Parish of St. Landry, was reported. An act to emancipate S. F. Milligan, of the Parish of Avoyelles. An act for the relief of Richard Breen. He further requested the concurrence of the Senate in the "An Act to amend an act, entitled an act to incorporate the Methodist Episcopal Church in the town of Baton Rouge, Parish of East Baton Rouge, approved January 25th, 1848."

Mr. Stiger offered a substitute, which, together with the original resolution, was on motion of Mr. Breyer, laid on the table indefinitely. Mr. Martin obtained leave to introduce the following resolution: Resolved, That the Attorney General be, and he is hereby ordered, to institute proceedings to test whether the Baptists and Methodists, Canal Company has not violated its Charter or Statutes.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES - The House dispatched the usual amount of local and general business during the morning. At 12 o'clock Mr. Adams moved to postpone the consideration of the vote taken yesterday on the bill to afford relief to the Free Colored Orleans Asylum. The priority of reconsidering the vote was debated by Messrs. Pitts and Wilder in favor of the motion, and Mr. G. Brown against it. Upon the question being put, the motion was sustained by a majority of the House. The vote was then taken on the final passage of the bill. Ayes, 32; Noes, 29. The Speaker voted in the affirmative, and declared the bill passed.

The amendments to the School law, being the order of the day, were taken up. The question was on striking out the 16th section, which in effect makes the 16th section grant to the township part of a common fund for the whole State. A long debate ensued, which had not closed when the House adjourned.

THE ROMAN CATHOLIC CLERGY of England, are collecting the poor and destitute children of their faith who have hitherto roamed through the streets of London, and several establishments have been formed, in which their temporal and spiritual wants are to be attended to.

SAVANNAH ELECTION - The Municipal election of Savannah (Ga.) terminated in the success of Richard Wayne (dem.) for Mayor, and eight democrats, and four whigs for the Board of Aldermen. The vote on the Mayor stands - Richard Wayne (dem.) 665; H. R. Blythe (whig) 640. The Aldermen elected were William H. Bullock, Solomon Cohen, Robert H. Griffin, Wm. H. Mongin, John F. Posey, Thomas Vane, Thomas M. Turner, Robert D. Walker, democrats; Joseph S. Fay, Francis S. Bartow, Robt. A. Lewis and R. R. Caylor, whigs.

MARRIAGE EXTRAORDINARY - The Indianapolis Journal chronicles the marriage in that city on the 22d ult. of Carey H. Boutright to Miss Margaret Thornton. This is Mr. B.'s ninth marriage.

POSTAL ARRANGEMENT WITH GREAT BRITAIN. The Washington correspondent of the Philadelphia Ledger says: "The postal arrangement between this country and Great Britain, talked of as concluded, both in English and American papers, is not yet definitely concluded. At least, the papers are in this respect abeyant of the Post-office Department. Fresh instructions have gone out to Mr. Bancroft."

THE SUPREME COURT - Those at least who have business at the Annual Term of the Supreme Court of the United States, and indeed all who entertain a proper respect for that balance-wheel of the machinery of this Government, should bear in mind that the term of that Court, as well as the session of Congress, commences on Monday next. Already we hear of the arrival in this city of three of the nine members of the Court, Mr. Justice McLean, Mr. Justice Catron and Mr. Justice Wayne. A quorum will doubtless be in attendance on the day of its assembling. - Nat. Intelligencer, 3d inst.

MINNESOTA TERRITORY - John Catlin, Secretary of the Territory of Wisconsin, and now acting Governor of Minnesota, returned home to Madison (Wis.) on the 10th ult. Mr. Sibley, the Minnesota delegate to Congress, is determined to procure a Territorial Government for Minnesota at the next session of Congress, if possible, as the people of this new region greatly desire to be taken under the protection of the laws of the United States.
