Arrival of the Steamer Washington.

LATER FROM EUROPE. (By telegraph we received from our Baltimore correspondent, a lengthy dispatch forwarded to us by mail to Petersburg, from whence it was transmitted by the telegraph wire to this city.)

These advices bring us news down to 11 o'clock on Monday night from New York, and state that the American steamship Washington reached that port on the afternoon of that day, with Liverpool accounts to the 19th ult., being three days later than the British steamer Europa.

We give the details of the news, as furnished by our correspondent.

The Markets. Cotton—Wilder & Smith's Times states that on Saturday, the 16th ult., the day the Europa sailed, the transactions in cotton were very active, and the market was well supplied by holders.

FRANCE.—General Intelligence. It is the general belief that Gen. Gaxiagnier will submit good will to the wishes of the people, as indicated by the elevation of Louis Napoleon to the Presidency of the French Republic.

Continental. The news from the Continent was not of much interest. The Hungarians were determined, as is stated, to make a bloody resistance to Austria.

DECREASE OF MORTALITY IN BOSTON.—The mortality in Boston for the year 1848, is a little over 4000 in number, which is a decrease of nearly a hundred on the year 1847, but an increase on 1846 of about 700.

MONEY RECOVERED.—The money stolen a few days since from the August Bank, in Maine, has all been recovered. It was found buried near Augusta, and the information which led to its recovery, is supposed to have been communicated by Wingate, who was arrested on suspicion of being concerned in the robbery.

CINCINNATI AND ST. LOUIS RAILROAD.—Prof. Mitchell, who has surveyed this road, estimates the entire cost of construction at \$5,000,000, including the salaries of officers for one year; that it can be completed in five years; that it will yield a dividend of fifteen per cent as soon as it is finished; and that the whole stock, if St. Louis, Cincinnati, and the places along the route, do as they should and no doubt will, can be raised in sixty days.

BANK OF MISSOURI.—The net profits of the mother bank, exclusive of the branches, from the 1st of January 1847, to 1st of January 1849, amount to \$208,309 71, which is an average, for the whole time, of about seventeen and one-third per cent. per annum.
