Correspondence of the Crescent.

NEW YORK, March 31, 1849.

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We learn by telegraph that the bill for payment of Rebel losses has passed the upper House of the Canadian Parliament, and now only requires the signature of the Governor-General.

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House-owners in this city, in view of the small number of stores and dwellings erected during the year just closed, advanced their rents for that commencing about 10 per cent.

He had also a right to insist upon the exhibition of a statement of the debts due by the partners for the purpose of ascertaining the amount falling to the State under the act of 1842, which amount was ascertained by him to be withheld from the heirs, and paid over by him to the State under penalty of his personal assets.

On the other hand, the curator was not entitled to withhold from the heirs the amounts due to the State, which he had not chosen to exercise.

The only error, therefore, in this portion of the decree, is in directing the curator to retain what may be due to creditors other than the State.

The attorney appointed to represent the absent heirs, in the case of the State, is Mr. J. B. M. Jones.

Supreme Court of Louisiana.

Condensed Decisions—NEW ORLEANS, March 28, 1849.

Where an estate was vacant, and a curator had been appointed, and subsequently the heirs, who were domiciled in Louisiana, and had no objection to the appointment of a foreign curator, the court held that the subjects of a foreign country appointed by the court in fact, to be put into possession of their ancestor's succession.

SUCCESSION OF ALEXANDER GEORGE: HEIRS OF ALEXANDER GEORGE EX. A. PENN. CURATOR. No. 1276. Appeal from the Eighth Judicial District Court, Parish of St. Tammany. S. L. DILLIARD, J. P. Curator.

The court rendered a decree recognizing them as heirs, and directing the curator to render his account conformably with the law, and that after payment of all the debts and legal charges established against said succession, he pay over and deliver to said heirs, in equal portions, the balance of the funds property belonging to the succession.
