REPORT OF THE GRAND JURY.—We received at a late hour last night the Report of the Grand Jury of this Parish, dated on Saturday last, and signed by J. K. Rayburn as Foreman.

THE TREASURY DEPARTMENT.—Retrenchment and Reform.—The Washington Whig contains a circular from the Treasury Department, addressed to the Collectors of Customs throughout the country, transmitting to each a copy of "an act requiring all moneys receivable from customs, and all other moneys to be paid immediately into the Treasury."

It will be apparent to you that the ready cooperation of all officers of the Customs will be necessary, in order to meet the requirements of this act; and any aid that you may afford, or any suggestions that you may make, will be highly valued.

The State of Chiapas is to be divided into seven Departments, the capitals of which are San Cristobal Las Casas, Comitán Tuxtla, Gutierrez, Tapachula, Teneoc, Villa del Palenque, Villa de Chiapas. Each Department will be divided into eleven districts, each with a chief town.

Col. Emilio Laneberg has offered in four months to raise for the Government of the State of Durango 300 foreign riflemen, Swiss or German, to be employed in fighting the savages who have so long infested the State.

Bankrupt Bishops.—Bishop Doane, of New Jersey, has failed for \$250,000, and is said to be able to pay but a trifling per cent. upon his liabilities. The fortune of his wife, formerly Miss Perkins, of Boston, is said not to be involved in this calamity.
