THE TEXAS ELECTIONS.—The Galveston News, of the 25th, speaks thus of the election and the returns: "It will be seen that our table gives returns from several additional counties both east and west of the Trinity; but these returns only serve to diminish Bell's total majority to about 2500. Bell's election is now beginning to be looked upon as nearly certain, even by his opponents. Howard's election is the only one that is no longer a matter of doubt. We had supposed that Swayne's election was involved in some uncertainty, but any other, on the supposition that he would receive a very large majority in the eastern counties; but the returns rather indicate the reverse. Between Henderson and Greer the contest is very questionable, though we incline to the opinion that the latter is elected. It will yet be several weeks before the returns will be complete, so that wherever the vote is anywhere a close one, we shall continue in the same uncertainty as to the issue, until the middle or 20th of September. The result of the Presidential election in France was made known to us in almost half the time required to bring in the returns from our extreme eastern and northern counties. We comment on the result of the election in the Post-office and Mail Department in Washington."

The Civilian of the 21st says: "We have no election returns from further east than Houston county. Col. Bell is a long way ahead for Governor, thus far, but the result still doubtful. Col. Howard is unquestionably elected for Congress. The result for Lieut. Governor is doubtful."

Great Fire—Donagana's Hotel in Ruins. On Friday morning, about half an hour after midnight, the city was alarmed by the cry of fire, and the ringing of the bells. The entire horizon appeared at the same moment to be in a blaze, to whichever side the spectator turned. On the eastward were the flames of a burning building; on the other the reflection thrown against the sky, which was remarkably clear and bright. On ascending into the street, it was manifest in an instant, that the conflagration had broken out in the magnificent pile known as Donagana's Hotel. At the time the writer first approached the scene of disaster, the fire could scarcely have appeared more than an hour and a half since it had broken out. The flames ascended the building throughout the whole length of the building on the western side.

Our readers are aware that the front of the hotel, ornamented with pillars, was situated on the corner of Notre Dame street, between the wall run down Bonsecours street to Champ de Mars street, where there was a long wing, in which the dining and concert room was situated. The end of this wing, therefore, formed the spectator's prospect from the western side of the street, and the line of buildings was continued to that street by the main body of the hotel. All this line was blazing, from the corner adjoining Mr. Boulanger's shop, which appeared to be in great danger of taking fire, to the eastern side of the dining room wing, and the fire was showing through the roof, and bursting out of each window. Proceeding down to Champ de Mars street, the spectators became one of great grandeur and beauty. The flames, which had reached the roof, had rapidly climbed the eaves, from which they were thrown off by the tin roof with dazzling brilliancy; and the whole scene presented a magnificent and flag-staff itself standing out in the strongest relief against the illuminated sky. After burning for some time, a sudden blaze shot up above the top of the eaves, and a column of smoke rose and a column of smoke rose over the spot where it had lately stood.

Many of the neighbors, terrified by the conflagration, had begun to move their goods, and the movement of the furniture was heard in the Champ de Mars, and St. Louis street, were all encumbered with beds, sofas, and all kinds of furniture. A guard of soldiers was drawn up across Notre Dame street, and the fire companies were on the ground with the greatest promptitude.

Notwithstanding all their efforts, it soon became evident that there was no hope of saving any portion of the goods, and the fire continued to spread, therefore directed to saving the surrounding property, and water was plentifully thrown on the neighboring roofs, especially on that of the National School, which is covered with shingles. In the meantime the destruction of the hotel proceeded, and, probably at about two o'clock, a loud cry called the attention of the bystanders to the back wall of the wing in Champ de Mars street, which immediately fell with a tremendous crash. The fall began from the end of the wing, and extended to the corner, where a number of cross walls strengthened the building. This corner continued standing for some time longer; but at a later period a great part of it also fell down. The falling of the building in Bonsecours street, with its eighty windows, soon after came down, too, making a gigantic ruin in the street.

During the progress of the conflagration several fire companies occurred. At a very early stage a great portion of the furniture was thrown from the windows of the hotel, and we regret to state that a chest of drawers, or some similar article, fell on the head of Mr. Freese, Jr., who was understood to be very dangerously injured. Towards daylight a still more serious accident occurred to a fireman named Douglas, a blacksmith, who was going up a ladder, when a stone from the coping of the building fell upon his head and struck him to the ground. The blow was fatal.

The inmates of the hotel, we believe, all escaped with their lives, and some of them saved a good deal of property; but others have lost many valuable articles. At a very short time before the breaking out of the fire there were a considerable number of persons in the bar of the hotel, and we understand that a person named McElhannon, who had become obnoxious to the crowd, was stripped naked. About the time the building fell, a number of riotous persons were fired in the bar and passages, to alarm the inmates up stairs.

The Disturbances in Montreal. For some time past, the telegraph has been busy with shreds of information respecting the disturbed state of the city of Montreal. The following, from the Montreal Gazette of the 15th, explains the cause of these disturbances, while it illustrates the feelings of the British party in Canada:

The foundation of a good deal of excitement was laid yesterday, and, we fear, of an excitement, which, if proceedings go on, will lead to results of no small importance. Arrangements were made, and it is stated that Gen. Rowan, commander of the forces, had left town, intending to be absent for some time, and was at the Caledonia Springs, where a despatch reached him on Saturday last requiring his immediate presence in Montreal. Arrangements were made on Monday for the speedy passage of troops from the island of St. Helen to the city, to reinforce the garrison in case the civil power should be overpowered.

THE WICHITA GOLD.—The Houston Telegraph of the 23d, says that the excitement about Gold in the Wichita mountains continues: "We learn from a gentleman who has lately arrived from the eastern frontier, that the gold excitement in that section has increased to a great extent. Hundreds of eager emigrants are flocking to the Wichita mountains, and we are confident that as valuable mines would be found there as in California. It was estimated that not less than fifteen hundred persons had gone from the Red River country to the Wichita mountains, and many were starting daily from the settlement. It is a singular fact, however, that not one on the frontier had seen any specimen of gold from these mountains, and none could tell where the mines were located. We have been informed that these mountains consist of granite-like summits, and the rocky strata composing them are arranged in horizontal layers. If this be the case, the report that the ore that has been found in all alluvial places, as no gold is found in the stratified rocks."

FROM THE EL PASO TROOPS.—The Western Tarian, (San Antonio,) of the 16th, gives the latest from the U. S. troops marching towards El Paso: "Mr. J. T. Peacock arrived in town yesterday, direct from Presidio del Norte, in seventeen days, with a wagon. He left the army on the 7th, at the Rio Pecos. The army had crossed, and the balance of the train would cross in a day or two. The officers and men were all in fine health and spirits. Mr. Peacock states that the army would arrive at El Paso from the Rio to the 20th of September. The army found a good road with plenty of grass and water. The road is considered good—a good natural road. Our informant says there are not many families in the mountains, and that the last spring only. Mr. Weston was absent at the time either on a tour to Europe or the mountains and will, of course, regret to hear of his loss. EXPEDITION THROUGH CALIFORNIA.—The Washington Republic gives an account of an expedition for ascertaining, with more accuracy than heretofore, the resources of California: "The route selected was from the upper part of the Sacramento along the foot of the Sierra Nevada to the upper waters of the San Joaquin, thence on a line near the coast to San Francisco, and afterwards through the region north of the bay along the sea. Gen. Smith and several officers of the staff, with Dr. Tyson, an experienced geologist of Maryland, and Com. Jones, if he could be spared from the coast, were expected to accompany the expedition. We may expect from this expedition a reliable account of the character of the country, its capability of cultivation, its products in minerals and timber, and much other information of interest. The annual product of gold is estimated at ten millions."
