

The British Treaty of 1794.

Mr. Webster, in his recent speech, referred to this treaty. The reporter makes him speak of it as negotiated by Mr. Jefferson. Mr. Webster could not have made the mistake, as we are more thoroughly acquainted with the diplomatic history of the United States.

The treaty referred to is Jay's Treaty, which was the first treaty negotiated by the United States with Great Britain, and is the most important in our annals. We propose to give a sketch of its history, which may be of interest to many of our readers.

By the first treaty, the King of Great Britain agreed to withdraw his armies, garrisons and fleets from the United States, without carrying away any negroes or other property of the American inhabitants. The States on their part, agreed to remove all impediments to the collection of the debts due by Americans to British merchants.

Neither of these stipulations had been faithfully executed. The British still retained their posts in the North West, ready to pour down on the frontiers "the tide of vengeance;" controlling the Indian tribes and thus keeping our remote settlements in constant terror. The reason given for this was that the States on their part, agreed to remove all impediments to the collection of the debts due by Americans to British merchants.

The treaty was not complied with the condition that the payment of debts. Other causes of dissatisfaction had grown out of the various British orders in regard to navigation, under color of which a very large amount of American tonnage had been seized and either confiscated or restored only after long and expensive litigation in the British Admiralty courts.

We complained, too, that in violation of the treaty, the British had carried away a large number of slaves. The great majority of the people had forgotten the wrongs and injuries suffered from the British, and were in hopes, for the credit of the State, that the bill will be considered to-morrow. This bill, I should add, was performed in all its details by the House.

The Consolidation bill will be taken up on Monday. The new City Charter bill passed the Senate to-day, and will go into effect on the 1st of April. The House went through a large number of bills to-day, and will do the same thing to-morrow; but so far, no general bills have been touched.

Telegraphed to the "Daily Crescent."

The following dispatch, containing some interesting Congressional and other news, was transmitted to Jackson by the Western Telegraph, and forwarded to us by mail.

WASHINGTON, March 11.—(Monday).—In the Senate, to-day, Mr. Bradley gave notice that he would, on Friday next, (the 15th) move to take up a report of the Senate on the removals from office of the judges of the Supreme Court.

The Senate then proceeded to consider the President's California message. Mr. Sumner, of New York, having the floor, reviewed at length the whole question of the admission of California, and gave his reasons why she ought to be admitted.

The perpetual unity of the empire appeared to him to hang upon the discussion of this day and this day. California, he said, was already a complete State, and could never be less than that. Nothing prevented her admission but a want of agreement among the States.

There are some who insist that her admission should be attended by the compromise of the slavery question. He was opposed to any compromise. Legislative compromise was always radically wrong. In conclusion, he said he would vote for the admission of California, directly, without conditions, qualifications or compromise.

Mr. Douglas then obtained the floor, when the further consideration of the resolutions was postponed till Monday.

The House went into Committee on the State of the President's California message. Mr. Stanton, of Kentucky, having the floor, contended that the Wilcox Provision was in direct opposition to the Constitution, that the citizens have a right to take their slaves to new Territories. He would vote for the admission of California with suitable boundaries, provided provision be made for the balance of the States to be admitted.

Mr. Fowler was in favor of admitting California with her present constitution. Mr. German then obtained the floor, when the Committee rose and adjourned.
