DEATH OF HON. FRANKLIN H. ELMORE.—We have intelligence, by telegraph, of the death at Washington, City, on the 30th ult., of Hon. F. H. Elmore, recently appointed by the Governor of South Carolina, Senator in the U. S. Congress in place of Mr. Calhoun.

Mr. Elmore was in feeble health when he accepted the appointment; but we were not prepared to see an intellect of his rank and standing, and a man of his own State and the country, pass so suddenly from the scene.

STAMBOAT ACCIDENTS.—We learn from the officers of Steamer James Havit, that the new steamer St. Louis, hence for St. Louis, when at Quantico, near that city, on the 30th ult., collapsed the flues of two of her boilers, killing a gentleman (name not given), who got on board, and about sixteen deck passengers.

THE FINANCIAL STATE OF THE FIRST MUNICIPALITY. A very lucid and interesting report has been presented by the Finance Committee, from which the following facts are derived:

THE OLD CORPORATION OWES \$200,000. The old Corporation owes \$200,000, and has been paid or provided for. The property of the old Corporation, it is estimated, will reduce the debt to be raised by taxation to \$1,000,000.

THE EXPENSES OF THE YEAR ARE ESTIMATED AT \$244,950; the income at \$231,348, leaving a balance of \$13,602. This, together with the cash warrants, now due, amounts to \$80,000. This deficit has resulted from the expenses of the crevasse.

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The Compromise Bills.

The Committee have reported three distinct bills, which, if simultaneously carried, will restore harmony to this distracted country. They are the most important measures since the compromise of the nullification crisis.

1st. Admits California as one of the States of the Union.

2d. Prohibits the States from legislating in respect to the public lands, the taxation of public domain, or a discriminating tax against non-resident citizens, and makes all navigable streams free; and provides that nothing herein contained shall be construed as recognizing or rejecting the proposition tendered by the people of California as articles of compact in the ordinance adopted by the Convention which formed the constitution of that State.

3d. Extends the laws of the United States not locally inapplicable, over California.

4th. Defines the boundaries of the Territory of Utah; on the West by California, North by Oregon, South and East by the ridge which divides the waters flowing into the great Basin and those flowing into the Gulf of California; and retaining the right of Congress to make new divisions or annex any portion of the same to other States or Territories.

5th. Defines the duration of the office of Governor and Fixates it at four years, and defines their duties.

6th. The Legislative Assembly consists of a Council of thirteen, and of a House of Representatives of twenty-six members. The Council is to be elected for two years, the Representatives for one year.

7th. The right of suffrage is given to all free white male citizens of the United States, resident in the Territory at the passage of this act. The General Assembly to regulate the qualifications at their first meeting. By the term citizens, is included the Mexicans who became citizens by the treaty.

8th. Prohibits all legislation on the subject of slavery, all laws to be submitted to Congress, and all laws to be passed by the Territory, shall be subject to the approval of the United States.

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Supreme Court.

Samuel G. Frazier vs. Patrick Irwin et al. Plaintiff, a citizen of Alabama, seeks to recover a slave who was run from that State, sold at public auction in this city, and purchased by Irwin.

The Court say: "We have always discontinued the practice upon which we have been frequently called to act, of bringing slaves to this State for the purpose of defining the right of property in them, and under the laws of the State from which they are taken."

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
