OUR COUNTRY.

Population of the United States.

The National Intelligencer publishes the following corrected table of the population of the United States. It says:

"In the Table of Population and Representation, as given in the Intelligencer, an error occurred in estimating the representative population in North Carolina at 648,000, instead of 745,000, based on 575,000 free inhabitants and 288,000 slaves. This, of course, will entitle North Carolina to eight members and a seat in the Senate, instead of seven (properly corrected) from the most reliable data within reach."

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The increase since 1840 has been, in round numbers, 67,000, or 55 1/2 per cent. The number of dwellings houses actually occupied by 25,000,000 persons being nearly seven persons to a house.

The number of deaths reported from June 1, 1840, to June 1, 1850, is 3,650,000 or 14 1/2 per cent.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF MASSACHUSETTS.—The average amount raised by the State for the support of schools is \$861,667 85, which, added to the income of the surplus revenue appropriated to schools (\$8,716,677) makes a total of \$9,578,344 85.

The average attendance in summer, 1849-50, was 1,778,272, or 10 per cent. The average attendance in winter, 1849-50, was 1,778,272, or 10 per cent.

The number of teachers in—males, 2442; females, 5985. The number of scholars, of all ages, in the schools in summer, 176,344; in winter, 194,403.

Average attendance in summer, 1848-49, in winter, 149,609. The average of 3717 scholars. The number of incorporated academies, private schools, and academies for young ladies, 1845, with an average of 19,534 scholars.

The average paid for tuition in these schools is \$261,341 92. These statistics exhibit a highly creditable condition of the public schools of the State, with the exception, perhaps, of the comparative attendance and the rate of compensation of the teachers, both of which we think are too low.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

BALTIMORE, March 2, 1851.

The House of Representatives has concurred in the Senate's amendment to the Cheap Postage Bill, and made it a law.
