They intended to give the Emperor 48 hours to decide and it was supposed he would submit to the terms proposed.

Prof. Devaney, of Dickinson College, Ohio, died of pneumonia on the 29th ult. He was 77 years old. For the week ending the 25th ult., 77 persons died in Baltimore: 147 in Philadelphia; 7 in Brooklyn; 10 in St. Louis; 19 in Cincinnati; and 11 in Memphis.
