Letter of J. H. Thrasmer, to a Brother Jonathan, in Jamaica, November 1851.

An American citizen, deprived of liberty and denied justice, respectfully begs leave to say before you the following facts and appeals.

Upon landing from the steamer Georgia, on the 16th of October last, I was suddenly, and without previous occasion, arrested and taken to the office of the police.

On the 21st of October I was thrown into a dungeon of the city prison, and all communication with my friends was strictly prohibited.

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I conferred with our Consul, and he passed several communications in my behalf to the Government here, all of which have been utterly disregarded and not replied to.

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Gen. Santa Anna, ex-President of Mexico, continues residing in the beautiful and romantic little village of Purhuan, about twelve miles from Carthagena, and celebrated for its hot springs or colonnades, so called by the natives.

From Jamaica.—By the Brother Jonathan at New York, we have dates from Kingston, Jamaica, of the 19th inst. There appears to be general dissatisfaction at Kingston with the proceedings of the Legislature.

A petition has been presented to the Legislature, asking a reduction of the present heavy charges on shipping.

Morning Journal of the 7th alleges that two negroes were conveyed away from the island in the steamer Illinois, and that this is the first time West India negroes have been "sold into slavery."

The cholera continues to prevail to some extent in parts of the interior.

South Carolina.—On the 29th ult., a bill to prohibit the introduction of slaves from any State north, north-east or north-west, into South Carolina, was before the Legislature of that State.

The following preamble and resolution were introduced, to be considered last Monday.

Resolved, That while we do not consider the right of man to an open question, and while we are determined to maintain it, we nevertheless believe that the people of this State should exercise their right of self-determination.

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An Interesting Sketch.

A correspondent of the St. Louis Republican, writing from the Indian Treaty ground, near Fort Leavenworth, gives the following interesting sketch: The firing of the cannon, and the hoisting of the flag, called the Indians together about eleven o'clock.

The only difficulty that presented itself was the selection of a chief for the Sioux nation. At the former meeting, Col. Mitchell had informed them that, if they could not select a chief among themselves, in whose support all the bands would unite, he would himself select one.

The First Election among the Indians.—After the speeches were through, Col. Mitchell informed them that he was willing to select a chief among themselves, if they could not select one among themselves.

Those who perished in the waters, in the floods of the Severn and the Thames, on the coast of Holland, and in ships blown away, and never returned, are estimated to amount to about eight thousand.
