

Heavy Bank Robbery.

The gigantic robbery of the Manhattan Savings Institution in New York city continues to be the sensation in that and other cities of the North and East. The robbers were as shrewd in covering their tracks as they were ingenious in planning the robbery. The latest reports state that of forty or fifty boxes stored away about twenty had been opened and their contents rifled. It is possible the amounts taken may be more than \$3,000,000, since the contents of ten boxes containing gold coin and government bonds, with which the sides of the vault were lined, have disappeared. The most singular circumstance in connection with this robbery is that the janitor, or watchman, was intrusted with the "combination" by which the vault of the bank could be opened. That officer, or servitor, was the man that the robbers attacked, handcuffed and forced at the peril of his life, to give up the combination by which they were enabled to gain access to the stores of wealth, in money, jewels and stock which were placed there for safe-keeping. The police detectives of New York are represented as being at their wit's ends for even a starting place from which to track the men who did this tremendous job of robbery, and it is probable that this great robbery will be shrouded in impenetrable mystery.

A NICE LITTLE TAR BABY.—A baby show was given in a town in Illinois for the benefit of a church. The most fashionable mothers entered their offspring, the charitable object overcoming their scruples, and over a hundred were put on exhibition. One was black; and when the ten cent ballot boxes were opened, that one was found to have been voted the prize for beauty.

SERVED HER RIGHT.—The owner of a house in Hartford, Conn., a widower, lived in the upper story and rented the lower part to a clergyman. A servant employed in the clergyman's family was young and pretty. Her mistress observed that that her and the widower were devoting a great deal of attention to each other, and deeming the matter scandalous, said to her: "Pick up your things and quit." The girl obeyed, but on the following day she returned in a carriage, announced that she had been married to the landlord, and said to her former mistress: "Pack up your things and quit."

The yellow fever in the South has been of great advantage, commercially, to Savannah, in the Southeast, the stock of cotton on the thirtieth ultimo at the five principal ports being: Savannah 79,410, Charleston 81,864, Galveston 80,707, Mobile 13,333, bales.

There is a kind of fly in Texas that lights upon drops of blood upon horses, cows, etc., and human beings, depositing hundreds of eggs, which form in an hour's time worms, some of them one-half inch in length. Recently a man, prostrate with the fever, was so unfortunate as to have some blood at his nose, when one of these alighted as soon as the man was asleep. Before the doctor discovered it the worms were formed. The only known remedy is carbolic acid and calomel, which being applied, one hundred and fifty-six worms were procured from his nose.

A TERRIFIED UNDERTAKER.—An undertaker in New Jersey was recently called to prepare the body of a woman for burial. In the attempt to straighten them the undertaker finally sat down upon them and was pressing them into the proper position in the coffin when something struck him from behind, and turning his head to see what it was, he was confronted with the face of the corpse close to his one. The pressure upon the legs had tilted the body upright, but the poor undertaker, not understanding, ran from the house in mortal terror.
