

LOCAL ITEMS.

ALL SAINTS' DAY.—Yesterday being the 1st of November, it was a day full of sad joy to all who have the refinement of heart to visit and pay proper tribute to those graves in our cemetery which are the receptacles of somebody's loved ones. We visited our "silent city" at twelve o'clock, and were pleased to note the many tributes of love which were shown on all sides. Festoons and wreaths of bright flowers and evergreens were lavished upon all the graves by the hands of Covington's fairest daughters, and it was late in the evening when the true hearts, that knew so much of sorrow, departed in tranquil sadness to their homes.

The total number of registered voters in this parish, to date, are 1,166—677 white and 489 colored. Ward No. 1, 152; No. 2, 90; No. 3, 245; No. 4, 225; No. 5, 71; No. 6, 64; No. 7, 116; No. 8, 117; No. 9, 86.

The epidemic of yellow fever in New Orleans is now at an end. By the last reports of the Board of Health there were only ten deaths and three new cases for the twenty-four hours ending at twelve o'clock last Tuesday. The city, we believe, is now considered healthy.
