The season for deer hunting has closed, the game law for their protection going into effect to-day. We are informed that they are very plentiful in the country, and in fine condition. A party from Covington went out last week and succeeded in killing three fine ones. The law as it now exists is an extremely bad one, at least for this portion of the State, as the deer are entirely too young to be killed in August.

MARDI GRAS EXCURSION.—The steamer New Camelia will make an excursion trip to the city, for the accommodation of those wishing to attend the Mardi Gras festivities, leaving the Old Landing Monday morning, February 24. Tickets will be good until Saturday, the 29th inst. The price of tickets has been fixed at the low sum of fifty cents for the round trip. The fare on the stages, from Covington to the Old Landing, on this occasion, will be half price, or fifty cents for the round trip.
