

Proceedings of the Police Jury.

FIRST DAY.

The Police Jury of the parish of St. Tammany met at the Court-house, in Covington, on Monday, February 3, 1879.

Present—Wm. Badon, President; George Kepp, Norman Fendleson, J. L. Dicks, Jesse Abney, Pat Welsh, Morris Tally, John Crow and Armand Cousin.

All the members being present, the Board proceeded to business.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Mr. J. M. Thompson offered his services as attorney to the Police Jury, gratuitously, which was unanimously accepted.

The committee appointed to examine the report of the late Treasurer, at the last meeting, reported that they examined the same and found it to be correct.

On motion of Mr. Welsh, the report was received and committee discharged.

Mr. A. LeBlanc presented a claim of \$250 for his services as Assessor, the last Police Jury having failed to make an appropriation.

It was moved and seconded that the amount be paid out of the collections of 1877, or from the sinking fund of 1879. Adopted.

Mr. LeBlanc also presented a bill of \$125, for his services for the year 1878, which, on motion, was approved and ordered paid out of the collections of 1878, or the sinking fund of 1879.

The following was then offered:

Resolved, That there be an additional Ward created in this parish, to be known as Ward No. 10; that said Ward comprise all that portion of the parish of St. Tammany lying on the island known as Honey Island.

Carried by the following vote:
Yeas—Badon, Abney, Kepp, Fendleson, Dicks, Crow, Welsh and Tally—8.

Nays—None.
The Coroner presented two bills for inquests, held on the 17th and 19th of January, 1879, for \$10 each, which, on motion, were approved.

Mr. J. Crow then presented the following:

Resolved, That the Coroner of the Parish be allowed the sum of \$150 per annum for his services, out of which he is to pay to the juries of inquest the sum of \$1 per day, for each inquest held. This resolution to take effect from date of passage, the Coroner to be paid quarterly on his own warrant.

Carried unanimously.

The bills of Mr. W. C. Morgan, for services as Clerk of the Court, for the month of December, 1878, amounting to \$12 50, as per contract, and for services rendered in recording Jury Commissions, etc., \$6 40, were read and approved.

On motion, the above claims were approved.

The bill of the Clerk of the Police Jury, for the month of January, 1879, \$8 33, was approved and ordered paid.

A committee was appointed, consisting of Messrs. Tally, Crow and Cousin, to confer with the Clerk of the Court, the Sheriff and the printer, and ascertain what they

would charge for their services for the year 1879.

The Jury then adjourned to meet Tuesday morning.

SECOND DAY.

Tuesday, February 4, 1879.

The Police Jury met pursuant to adjournment, all the members being present except J. L. Dicks.

Mr. Welsh asked leave of absence, as he was not well, which was granted.

The committee appointed to confer with the parish officers presented their report, as follows:

The Sheriff proposes to do all the work pertaining to his office, except attendance upon the Court, for \$600 per annum.

The Clerk of the District Court, in Criminal cases, \$150.

The Parish Printer agrees to publish all the proceedings of the Police Jury, for the year 1879, for \$50.

On motion, the report was received and adopted, and the committee discharged.

Mr. Abney then presented the following:

Resolved, That the Overseers of Roads shall summon all persons liable to road duty, between the ages of fifteen and forty-five years, except ministers of the gospel, engaged in the duties of their calling; all teachers and students of any college, academy or school; all blind and deaf persons, and all persons maimed or disabled by disease or otherwise.

Adopted.

Mr. Crow offered the following:
Resolved, That there shall be a public road laid out from Bayou La Combe to the Pearl River road, near Pat Welsh's, and all the lands subject to road duty above or to the north of said road, or on the west side of said Bayou, and on the east side of said Bayou from above Martin's bridge down to the little Bayou Ford, be attached to said road; and that J. Crow, Pat Welsh, J. A. Ernest, Judson Toomer, A. T. Stiker and A. G. Tucker be appointed commissioners to lay out said road.

Adopted.

Mr. Crow also offered the following:
Resolved, That the road be changed leading to the ferry on Bayou La Combe, beginning at the ferry, running directly with the line, to intersect the Mandeville road; and that Octave Cousin, Emile Cousin, James Tally, Phillip Magee, J. R. Toomer and W. H. Toomer be appointed commissioners to lay said road, and to be furnished with a copy of the oath required by law.

Adopted.

Mr. Crow offered the following:

Be it enacted, by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, That there shall be levied, for the year 1879, a tax of two mills on the dollar for a school fund; a further tax of two mills on the dollar for the payment of criminal expenses; and a further tax of five mills on the dollar for the payment of the general expenses of the parish.

Be it further enacted, etc., That there shall be levied an annual amount, as a license, on all persons following any trade or occupation taxed by the State, the same amount as said persons are compelled to pay by the revenue laws of the State, said licenses to be collected by the tax collector, for the benefit of the parish, in the same manner as State licenses are collected.

Be it further enacted, etc., That the tax collector be instructed to collect from all residents of the parish, including the inhabitants of Mandeville and Covington, the two mill tax levied for the school fund, and the two mills levied for criminal expenses; that said taxes be collected in cash and paid to the Parish Treasurer, who shall keep them separate from the other funds of the parish.

Be it further enacted, etc., That the tax collector shall receive the certificates of Grand and Petit Jurors in payment of the five mill tax levied for general purposes; *Provided*, That the Jury certificates of 1879 only shall be received in payment of the general tax of five mills for 1879; *be it further provided*, That the taxes levied at this session shall be collectable forthwith, on the existing tax roll.

Be it further enacted, etc., That there shall be collected this year no other parish tax, except that levied at the present session of this Jury, and that on the delinquent lists; that jury certificates issued in 1877 and 1878 shall be receivable for delinquent taxes.

Adopted unanimously.

The Jury, in Committee of the Whole, enacted that there shall be appropriated from the general fund of the parish the following amounts:

Pay of Grand and Petit Jury.....	\$800

Clerk of Police Jury.....	25
Coroner's and jury fees.....	150
Commissions of Tax Collector.....	400
Contingent fund.....	150
Assessor's fees.....	125

And from the tax of two mills for criminal expenses:

Pay of Sheriff.....	\$600
Clerk of District Court.....	150
Parish Printing.....	50

Mr. Crow moved that the members of the present Jury charge for their services for the present year \$1 50 per day, and five cents a mile each way for traveling expenses, and that in lieu of \$100 per annum allowed to their secretary, he be allowed the sum of \$25 per annum.

Carried.

The Sheriff's bill, for services of last term of court, was approved and allowed to the amount of \$259 20.

There being no further business, the Jury adjourned, to meet on the second Monday in June, 1879.
