**AN OYSTER KNIFE AND A DOZEN RAW.**—Mr. Charles Frickey has placed us under obligations for a curiosity, in the shape of a cluster of oysters, the center of which is penetrated by an old oyster knife. It is supposed that some oysterman accidentally dropped his knife into the oyster bed, and the vindictive bivalves, recognizing their old enemy, at once seized upon and overwhelmed it. The cluster was caught by Captain John Rhodes, of the oyster boat "Velocity," on the 3rd inst., at Stump Point, or Point Chico. At first there was twenty oysters attached to the knife, but there are only twelve adhering to it at present. Persons desiring to see this curiosity of the deep can do so by calling at our office.

The picnic on Tchefuncta river, near the new bridge, last Saturday, was a success in every respect. The weather was delightful, and all seemed to be enjoying themselves. By a strange combination of circumstances, we arrived on the grounds just as the cloth was spread for dinner. And such a dinner! All the delicacies of the season, as well as substantial, were placed on the cloth in tempting confusion. A bevy of beauties and yearning youths were soon busily engaged in demolishing the good things, "and great was the destruction thereof." After dinner came music and dancing, boat riding, and various other amusements, until the lengthening shadows gave warning that it was time to return.

In the morning, as a wagon laden with belles, beaux and baskets, was about to start, the horses became frightened and ran at full speed down Florida street toward the river. The reins broke and the driver was powerless to stop them. But as they neared the steep embankment two bystanders ran out and seized the horses by the bit, at the infinite danger of their own lives, and succeeded in checking them, thus preventing what might otherwise have proved a very fatal catastrophe.

**GENERAL NEWS.**

The Senate Committee on Elections took up the Spofford memorial last Tuesday, and after some informal discussion, agreed to hear argument immediately upon the reopening of the case, and notified Messrs. Spofford and Kellogg to appear at the next meeting of the Committee, personally or by counsel.

A bill has passed the House appropriating \$200,000 for disinfecting ships at quarantine at the port of New Orleans.

The cattle disease known as pleuro-pneumonia is reported to be slowly disappearing.

A joint stock company has been formed in St. Louis, with shares of one dollar each. The object is to help negroes to emigrate from one part of the country to another.

Cyrus Field has bought the lot on which, as tradition reports, Major Andre was hanged, and in due time a sightly stone will be erected and inscribed, at Mr. Field's expense.

Washington Nathan has entirely recovered from the bullet wound he received at the hands of Mrs. Barrett. The warrants issued for Mrs. Barrett will not be executed, as the friends of Nathan have induced him to withdraw all further proceedings.

The Liquor and Lager Association of New Jersey are considering the propriety of taking steps to have the old Sunday law fully enforced. It provides that no horse cars, steam cars or steamboats can be run; no newspapers, cigars, ice cream, candy, soda water, oysters or refreshments can be sold; no traveling can be done in carriages or on horseback for pleasure, and no walking, except to and from church. Such is the old New Jersey State law, which has never been repealed.

L. S. Chase, of Chicago, a prominent commission merchant, committed suicide last Tuesday.

**FENCE INSPECTOR.**—We believe there is a law somewhere in the Digest of Police Jury Ordinances, which requires the appointment of a Fence Inspector. It has been suggested to us that such an officer should be appointed now, as a number of cases have occurred recently where people have shot animals and cattle that were not vicious. A legal fence should be "pig tight, bull strong, and horse high," and then the proprietor would have a just right to shoot any vicious animals or cattle that enter his premises."—Iberville South.

**THE CHINESE.**—Pious sentimentality is at a discount, and John is being regarded in precisely the light that he should be—that of a stupid, pork-eating serf, who comes to our shores without a wife or child, lives in a cellar, engenders filth and disease, has no motives, save greed, makes paupers of civilized workmen, and sends every dollar he can steal to the land he came from, and to which, dead or alive, he ultimately intends to go. This is John as we know him, and as others know him who have experienced his odious presence, and in the sober aspect of reality he is becoming to be recognized in the East. A slave by instinct, his mission is to destroy free labor, and in California this fact is as palpable as sunshine. That it has been tolerated to the present period is the most conclusive evidence that could be adduced of the intelligence and law-abiding characteristics of our free industrial classes.—San Francisco Chronicle.
