Bosque Dead.

Anatole Bosque died at his home in Mandeville last Tuesday evening, at 7 o'clock, of wounds received during the difficulty in which Capt. Boyle lost his life, on the 8th inst. Coroner Dusse proceeded to Mandeville and held an inquest over the body, the jury rendering a verdict in accordance with the facts as already known to our readers. The body was taken to the city on Wednesday and interred in the St. Louis Cemetery.




