THE PARISH CANDIDATES.

The ticket nominated by the Parish Convention, last Monday, is one that recommends itself to the entire people of the parish, as being one of the very best that could possibly have been selected.

Mr. A. W. Weems, the candidate for Representative, is an old citizen of the parish. He is thoroughly conversant with the wants of our people, commands the esteem and respect of his fellow-citizens, and possesses that rare ability and intellect which it is urgently desirable should distinguish all the members of our next Legislature. The Democratic party is exceedingly fortunate in having secured a candidate for Representative who is so deservedly popular throughout the parish.

Mr. W. C. Morgan, the candidate for Clerk of the Court, has filled that office with such ability, and has been retained in the office for so long a time, we feel that there is nothing for us to say which might advance his interests or render him more popular with the people. The greatest proof that he has given universal satisfaction, is found in the fact that the people, who first placed him in the office, are determined to keep him there, at least for the next four years. 
