**MARDI GRAS
In Covington.**

There is to be a Grand Mardi Gras celebration in Covington, on Tuesday, the tenth day of February next. Extensive preparations are being made to make this event a grand success in every respect.

The programme includes a magnificent day procession, and a masquerade ball at night.

It is the intention to make this celebration the grandest affair that has ever been witnessed on this side of the Lake.

Our friends throughout St. Tammany and Washington parishes are cordially invited to come to Covington and participate in the festivities.

It will be a grand gala day, with plenty of fun for all. Don't fail to come, and bring all your friends, Tuesday, February 10. "And don't you forget it!"

THE HOOD ORPHANS.—We were shown yesterday, by Mr. Goldsby, the artist, a large and handsome photograph of the "Hood orphans," taken by Lillenthal, of New Orleans. The children are tastefully arranged in groups in the center of a large room. On the right is a vacant chair, denoting the death of one of their number. On the left is an excellent picture of Gen. Hood, while hanging on the wall in the background is a picture of the mother. It is a perfect work of art, and would be an ornament to any parlor, aside from the interest which is felt by the public in these young orphan children of the illustrious Gen. Hood. The picture can be seen, for the next two weeks, at Mr. Goldsby's gallery, in the Courthouse, and those who have never seen it should do so at once.

THE WAIF RETURNED.—Mrs. Watkins, (colored,) returned to Covington last Saturday evening with the babe that was left on the gallery of her residence on the night of the 4th inst. It was refused admission into the Asylum in New Orleans. We learn that is her intention now to raise and educate the child, and for this purpose will accept assistance from those who are charitably disposed.

At the meeting of the Town Council, last Thursday evening, our esteemed and highly respected fellow-citizen, Mr. W. G. Kentzel, was elected Secretary of that honorable body. Ahem!

MARDI GRAS EXCURSION TO THE CITY.—The large and handsome Lake steamer *New Camelia* will make an excursion trip to the city, for the benefit of those who desire to attend the Mardi Gras festivities in New Orleans. The excursionists will start from the Old Landing on Monday morning, February 9, at 7 o'clock. Fare for the round trip, one dollar. The tickets will be good for one week, and excursionists can return either on Thursday or Saturday night.

NEW BRIDGE.—A large and substantial new bridge has just been built over the deep gully near the residence of Capt. Miller, on the road leading to the "big bridge" across the Bogue Falia. This was a much needed improvement, as the old structure was in a dangerous condition. The bridge is forty-five feet in length, and extends some distance beyond the banks of the gully on either side. Much credit is due to the Town Council for the promptness in which they attended to the matter.


