PROCEEDINGS

—OF THE—

POLICE JURY

—OF—

St. Tammany Parish.

COVINGTON, LA., May 17, 1880.

The newly appointed members of the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany met on the above date at the Courthouse.

The meeting was called to order by the Clerk of the old Board, who proceeded to call the roll, when all the members answered to their names, as follows:

First ward, Paul Dulion; second ward, Milton Burns; third ward, J. M. Allison; fourth ward, Wm. Rogers; fifth ward, W. E. Parker; sixth ward, Pat Welch; seventh ward, M. H. Crary; eighth ward, Chas. Aubry; ninth ward, A. Cousin; tenth ward, J. W. Smith.

The Board then proceeded to effect a temporary organization, by electing J. M. Allison, President, and W. G. Kentzel, Secretary.

Upon examination, it was found that all the members had received their commissions and were duly qualified.

The Board then proceeded to organize permanently, by electing the following officers:

President—J. M. Allison.

Secretary—W. K. Kentzel.

Treasurer—Jas. O. Poole.

The Board established the salary of the Secretary and Printer at \$150 per year.

The following changes in public roads and overseers were then made:

From the Pontcharotoway bridge to the Chinchuba, G. S. Strain, Jr., overseer, in place of Ira E. Strain.

From Bayou Lacombe to the ward line, on the Bonfouca road, Chas. Hartman, overseer, in place of Drosin Ducrey.

From Strove's place to Salt Bayou on the West Pearl River road, David Danielson overseer, in place of M. H. Crary.

Mr. Rogers offered the following:

Resolved, That the Covington and Mandeville road be extended to the corporation line of Mandeville; also, that the Bayou Lacombe and Mandeville road be extended to the corporation line of Mandeville.

Adopted.

Mr. Dulion offered the following:

Resolved, That the Bridge road, from Madisonville to Covington, be extended to the corporation line of Covington.

Adopted.

Mr. Burns offered the following:

Resolved, That the town of Covington be compelled to build a bridge across the Holmesville road, over the ditch dug by the corporation across said road. And that the Secretary be and he is hereby instructed to furnish the Town Council of Covington with a copy of this resolution.

Adopted.

Mr. Aubry offered the following:

Resolved, That the resolution offered by Mr. Crow, at the March meeting, 1880, of the Police Jury, making the public road to begin at the ferry at the saw mill, to intersect the Mandeville road, be repealed, and that the road crossing at Francois Cousin's be made the public road. Adopted.

Mr. Cousin offered the following appointments of road overseers:

On the road extending from the bridge on Bayou Vincent to the Church on the Pearl River Road, Evariste Gusman, Jr., overseer.

From Widow Carriere's place, on the east bank of Bayou Liberty, to Enoch Tally's, on the Pearl River road, Martin Gusman, overseer.

The President then appointed the following committees:

Committee on estimate of expenses for 1880: W. E. Parker, chairman; M. Burns and A. Cousin.

Committee to examine the books and accounts of the Treasurer: P. Welch, chairman; J. W. Smith and Paul Dulion.

The committees were instructed to report to the Board on Tuesday, at 12 o'clock m.

On motion, the Board then adjourned until Tuesday, at 12 m.

SECOND DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

Pursuant to adjournment, the Police Jury met at 12 m. on Tuesday, all the members present.

The minutes of Monday's session were read and approved.

The committee to examine the books and accounts of the Treasurer presented their report:

To the honorable President and members of the Police Jury:

Gentlemen—We the undersigned committee, appointed to examine the books and accounts of the Treasurer, beg leave to report as follows:

On motion, the report was received and committee discharged.

Mr. Burns then made a motion that the amount now in the hands of the Treasurer, to the credit of the Courthouse and Jail Fund, be expended on repairs to the jail, and that the President appoint a committee of three to ascertain what repairs are necessary, and award the contract for the work, to the best advantage to the parish, the repairs to be paid for when accepted by the committee. Adopted.

The President then appointed the following committee on repairs to the jail: M. Burns, chairman; W. E. Parker and Paul Dulion.

The members of the committee, in accepting the appointment, announced their willingness to serve without compensation.

The following was then read:

NEW ORLEANS, May 18, 1880.

To whom it may concern:

This is to certify that Mr. Philip Haelzel volunteered to loan a large plow to the parish of St. Tammany, and did loan the same, for the purpose of working the public road,

during the fall of 1879, and while in the service of said parish the plow was badly broken. Respectfully,

A. L. REDDEN, ex-Supervisor.

On motion, the above communication was laid on the table.

The Treasurer presented the delinquent tax roll of 1878, amounting to \$2,279 22.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to turn the same over to the Sheriff, for collection according to law.

The Treasurer was authorized to procure blank parish licenses, of the necessary denominations, to the amount of \$1000.

Mr. Rogers offered a resolution in regard to the establishment of a public road from Mandeville to Bogue Chitto ferry, and appointing overseers for the same, which was laid over until next meeting.

The Treasurer announced that he had in his possession cancelled warrants and licenses to the amount of \$2,948 68.

The President appointed Mr. Pat Welch a committee of one to burn said cancelled warrants and licenses.

On motion, the attention of road overseers throughout the parish was called to the fact that under the new law the age of persons subject to road duty has been changed so as to include all persons "between the ages of fifteen and fifty years," instead of "fifteen and forty-five years," as heretofore.

A communication from Mr. Isaac Evans, proposing to make certain repairs to the Courthouse and Jail, for \$100, was laid on the table.

A communication from Coroner Dusse, proposing to contract with the Police Jury for the year 1880, in the sum of \$150, payable quarterly on his own warrant, was referred to the committee on expenses for 1880.

The committee on estimate of expenses for the present year asked for further time, until the assessment is made, in order to prepare their report. Granted.

On motion, Sheriff Cook was authorized to purchase a seal for the Clerk of the Court, and necessary books for the Clerk and Recorder, and a warrant book for the Clerk of the Police Jury, and retain payment for the same out of the first money collected for taxes and licenses of the present year.

Mr. Cousin offered the following:

Resolved, That the President of the Police Jury be instructed to have a notice published in the St. Tammany Farmer, notifying all persons holding certificates or approved bills of previous Police Juries, issued prior to the year 1878, to present the same at the next meeting of this Police Jury, in order that they may be examined and approved, if not prescribed, as the law directs. Adopted.

The following resolution was then adopted:

Resolved, That all licenses for the parish of St. Tammany be fixed at the same amount as those of the State.

On motion of Mr. Welch, the salary of members of the Police Jury was established at three dollars per day, and five cents mileage.

A motion to pay the Treasurer a salary of \$200 per year was defeated, and further consideration of the subject postponed until next meeting.

The Police Jury then adjourned, subject to call of the President.
