When the hour of departure arrived, the whistles of the New Camelia and the other boat, striking up simultaneously, fairly filled the forest with their ringing voices, which re-echoed for miles around. QUEER ROBBERS.

A desperate attempt at robbery occurred last Monday night at Clear Lake, Collins county, Texas. A farmer named Bradley left \$200, received for cattle, with his wife for safe keeping. A stranger asking to stay all night was given a pallet on the gallery. At midnight he saw two men, whom he supposed belonged to the family, enter the house. Hearing cries of murder, he peered through the blinds, and saw a woman on the bed with her throat cut. Snatching a six-shooter, the stranger sprang toward the door and fired, killing both parties. Mounting his horse he rode to the nearest neighborhood, and, accompanied by a party of four men, returned. Mrs. Bradley and both the robbers were dead, one of whom was shot through the heart and the other through the head. The robbers proved to be two women, Mrs. Pruett and her daughter, the former sixty years old and the owner of considerable property, having an independent inheritance of \$17,000.

A little three-year-old girl, who volunteered to say grace at the table, did so as follows: "O Lord, bless the things we eat; bless mamma, papa, and gamma and gampa," and here, casting up her eyes to her grandfather in the next seat, and discovering that he was smiling, the little one closed her prayer by saying: "Belave yourself, grandpa, for Christ's sake, Amen."


