There was a duel near Covington last Sunday evening. After having heard all the shocking details of this horrible affair, we are happy to state that there was "nobody hurt."

The report is that in the Pearl River country bears are unusually numerous. Some time this fall, with our gun and dog, we propose to visit that section, and then these reports will likely be changed, and a scarcity of bears will be noted.

There is considerable interest and no little dissatisfaction manifested with the result of the census in this parish, and especially in Covington. As a result of this, S. B. Staples, Esq., has canvassed this town, and reports that he found 141 more people than the census enumerator reports.

FINE SCUPPERNON GRAPES.—Judge Thompson has favored us with a sample of Scuppernon grapes that we are confident cannot easily be excelled. They are from a vine on the grounds of our neighbor, G. W. Sully, Esq. The vine is sixteen years old, and covers an area of 150x50 feet, and is now loaded with the luscious fruit. The sample before us is in clusters, not unlike the Concord, and one bunch, which is of course the largest, contains sixteen grapes, of equal size and uniformly ripened. We are told that many of the clusters contain over twenty grapes. This is another evidence of the productive capacity of the piney woods.

PROCEEDINGS

—OF THE—

POLICE JURY

—OF—

St. Tammany Parish.

COVINGTON, LA., Aug. 10, 1880.

The Police Jury met at the Courthouse on the above date, all the members being present.

The minutes of the last meeting were read.

Mr. Burns offered the following amendment to the resolution adopted at the last meeting, in reference to receiving warrants for taxes and licenses:

Resolved, That all certificates and approved bills of 1879 be received for all back taxes prior to January 1, 1880; and that all certificates and approved bills for the year 1880 be receivable for taxes and licenses for the year 1880.

Adopted.

The committee appointed to examine the desk in the Recorder's office, and ascertain the value and cost of the same, reported that they had examined the desk and found it to be in good order, and recommended that it be purchased, for the sum of thirty dollars.

Laid over until next meeting.

A petition asking that Messrs. James Grey, Charles Eastiot, Francis Debois and Benj. Populas be assigned to work on the road leading from Covington to the turpentine road, by way of Lacroix's bridge, was adopted.

A communication from Frank Jackson, road overseer, calling attention to the dilapidated condition of the bridge across the Abita, on the Mandeville road, was laid on the table.

A petition from citizens on West Pearl River, engaged in hauling timber, asking that Dickson's Landing, on Doubleton Bayou, be declared a public landing, and the road leading to said landing be declared a public road, was laid on the table.

The following communication was then read:

BAYOU LACOMBE, Aug. 3, 1880.

To the honorable President and members of the Police Jury:

Gentlemen—I beg leave to inform you that I am willing to pay a bonus of ten dollars for the lease and privilege of the ferry across Bayou Lacombe. Yours, etc., ELY NEUBURGER.

On motion, the above communication was laid on the table, and the ferry across Bayou Lacombe ordered to be advertised for sale at public auction, to the highest bidder, at the next meeting of the Police Jury.

A petition offered by Mr. Rodgers asking for the establishment of a public road from Mandeville to the Bogue Chitto ferry, was granted.

Mr. Jules Beaujeux was appointed overseer of said road, from the head of Girard street, in Mandeville, to Pouchatoloway Bayou, at Sim Strain's ford.

Mr. J. E. Smith, ex-Parish Treasurer, presented a bill for services rendered, from January 14, 1874, to January 14, 1875, amounting to \$100, upon which the sum of \$20 30 had been paid, and asking for a new warrant for the balance due, \$79 70.

On motion the request was granted, the warrant to be receivable for taxes and licenses due prior to January 1, 1879.

The following bills were then approved:

Mr. Alf. LeBlanc, Parish Assessor, asked permission to have the warrants for his salary reduced to warrants of smaller denominations.

On motion, the request was granted.

Within a very few years past the sheep industry of North America has made greater progress than perhaps any other save only that of dairying. Both of these are likely to continue their growth for many years to come, because of our capacity for their development at merely nominal cost, and because we have both a good home and foreign market for all the butter and cheese, wool and mutton, we can produce. And these two together will in all probability progress at the expense of the hog product, or in other words, the production of pork will depreciate as the others increase. Several circumstances combine to indicate this change in our industrial efforts, the chief of which are the uncertainty of the hog crop on account of disease, and the growing impression that swine flesh is not the most desirable article of diet. In the building up of these two industries we should be careful to make haste slowly, otherwise waste will bring waste, and waste want, as sure as the sun shines. In other words, commence with a few, and expand with growing knowledge and experience.—Er.


