ELECTION NOTICE.

Whereas, it is provided by an act of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, approved March 16, 1879, that an election shall be held on the first Monday in June of each year, by the qualified electors of the town of Covington, St. Tammany parish, La., for the purpose of electing one Mayor and six Aldermen, to serve as such for the ensuing twelve months thereafter, as the law directs—

Now, therefore, I, Wm. C. Morgan, clerk of the Eighteenth Judicial District Court for the Parish of St. Tammany, La., in compliance with the fifth section of said act, do issue this notice, notifying all persons concerned to hold said election, on

Monday, June 5, 1882,

with the view of electing the above-named officers; and said election to be conducted, and the returns thereof made, in the manner required by the laws of the State of Louisiana.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE POLICE JURY

St. Tammany Parish.
COVINGTON, LA., May 9, 1882.
The Police Jury met at the Courthouse on the above date.
Present—J. M. Allison, President; W. B. Rogers, Milton Burns, R. Galatas, W. E. Parker and A. Cousin.
Absent—James W. Smith, M. H. Crary, C. Aubry and P. Welch.
The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved, with the exception of the commission to J. L. Phillips, road overseer, which was corrected as follows:
From the east end of the Marigny cow-pen to the corporation line of Mandeville, at the head of Girod street, thence to the Covington road. The Committee appointed to examine the books of the Tax Collector and Treasurer, reported that

Mr. Parker moved that the committee be discharged. Adopted.

On motion of Mr. Galatas, the Parish Attorney was instructed to take the necessary judicial steps to enforce Mr. Poole to deliver his books to the Secretary, for the purpose of investigation.

The President then appointed the following committee to examine the books of the Tax Collector and Treasurer, and report at next meeting: Messrs. Burns, Parker, Rogers and Galatas.

On motion of Mr. Rogers, the salary of the Parish Treasurer was fixed at \$100 per year.

On motion, the Parish Attorney, Treasurer and Secretary were authorized to draw their salaries quarterly, on their own warrants.

The Assessment Rolls were examined and declared to be incomplete, on account of omissions, etc., and on motion, the Secretary was instructed to notify Mr. Gause, Assessor, to have the corrections made immediately and report at the next meeting.

The Committee on Estimate of Expenses asked further time, on account of the incompleteness of the Assessment Rolls, which was granted, and they were instructed to have their report ready at next meeting.

Mr. Rogers offered the following: Resolved, That the Parish Treasurer be and is hereby instructed to report to the Police Jury at every meeting. Adopted.

Resolved, That the Police Jury hereby agree to pay one-third of the amount necessary to rebuild the big bridge across the Bogue Falin, at Covington. Adopted.

The following resolution, defining the duties of the Parish Attorney, was then read and adopted:

Resolved, That the duties of the Parish Attorney shall be to represent the parish in all cases where the parish is either plaintiff or defendant, to prosecute suit against delinquents on the road, suits for the recovery of licenses and taxes due the parish, and to give legal advice when called upon.

NEW PUBLIC ROAD.
The following resolution, establishing a new public road, was adopted:

Resolved, That a public road be established from the head of Girod street, in Mandeville, to intersect

the Pearl River road at Long Branch Hotel. And that the following named gentlemen be appointed to lay out said road: Messrs. John Jay, Zach Strain and August Shantz.

BILLS PRESENTED.

F. A. Guyol, Justice of the Peace, to services in case of State vs. Joe Batiste, \$6 87 1/2. Reduced one-half and approved.

J. O. Poole, to two years services as Parish Treasurer, to January 23, 1882, \$400. Laid over till next meeting.
