ELECTION NOTICE.

Whereas, it is provided by an act of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, approved March 16, 1870, that an election shall be held on the first Monday in June of each year, by the qualified electors of the town of Covington, St. Tammany parish, La., for the purpose of electing one Mayor and six Aldermen, to serve as such for the ensuing twelve months thereafter, as the law directs—

Now, therefore, I, Wm. C. Morgan, clerk of the Eighteenth Judicial District Court for the Parish of St. Tammany, La., in compliance with the fifth section of said act, do issue this notice, notifying all persons concerned to hold said election, on

Monday, June 5, 1882,

with the view of electing the above-named officers; and said election to be conducted, and the returns thereof made, in the manner required by the laws of the State of Louisiana.

NEW ORLEANS, May 7, 1882.

The undersigned will apply to the Legislature of Louisiana, at its session to commence May 8, 1882, for passage of a law granting to it the right of way from any point in St. Tammany parish, Louisiana, to the Mississippi river in Orleans Parish, to lay water pipes, dig ditches, appropriate land therefor, to build dams, works and dykes across and on and in streams, to prevent and punish the pollution of streams and water to be so conveyed to the city of New Orleans, and to protect the purity and secure the conveyance to any point in the limits herein indicated of water, from such streams.
