THE NEW GAME LAW.

No. 79. AN ACT

To amend and re-enact sections one, two and three of Act No. 60 of regular session of 1879, entitled "An act for the protection of game, animals and birds in the State of Louisiana."

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, That sections one, two and three of Act No. 60, of 1879, be amended and re-enacted so as to read as follows:

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, That it shall be unlawful in this State to catch, kill or pursue with such intent, any wild duck, deer or fawn, or to have the same in possession after it has been caught or killed, between the first day of March and the first day of October of each year, under a penalty of not less than twenty-five nor more than fifty dollars for each offense.

Section 2. Be it further enacted, etc., That persons who shall catch, kill or pursue with such intent, or have the same in possession after it has been caught or killed, any wild turkey, between the fifteenth day of March and the first day of October, in each year, under a penalty of not less than ten nor more than twenty dollars for each offense.

Sec. 3. Be it further enacted, &c. That no person shall catch, kill or pursue with such intent, or have the same in possession after it has been caught or killed, any quail, partridge, or pheasant, between the first day of April and the first day of October in each year under a penalty of not less than ten or more than twenty-five dollars for each offense; Provided the police juries of the various parishes may regulate the time the provisions of the above sections one, two and three are to take effect in their respective parishes; and provided further, that in each and every parish in which the said police juries shall fail to regulate such time, the time specified in said sections one, two and three shall prevail, and all laws and parts of laws in conflict with the same are hereby repealed.

Approved July 5, 1882.
